The Omicron variant of Covid-19 is more contagious than the original COVID-19 virus. To address the increasing community need for COVID-19 testing amid the omicron surge, the Florida Department of Health in Leon County has teamed up with key community partners: Nomi Health and Tallahassee Memorial HealthCare to open a new COVID-19 testing site to help meet the increased demand for COVID-19 testing.

The new walk-up testing site at Tallahassee Memorial Hospital (1528 Surgeons Drive) is open to the public 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. daily. The site offers rapid testing and PCR testing. Appointments are not required.

To answer questions about vaccines and other COVID-related questions, the Florida Department of Health operates a 24/7 COVID-19 call center at (866) 779-6121. Leon County residents can also call the County Health Department at (850) 404-6300, Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

If you are in need of a mask, you may pick up a free mask from your nearest <u>LeRoy Collins Public Library System</u> branch.

Thomasville Road Multi-Use Path



As you likely have heard, the Capital Regional Transportation Planning Agency (CRTPA) staff has been evaluating the possibility of constructing a paved pathway along Thomasville Road, from Betton Road to Metropolitan Boulevard and then connecting to the Market District.

Contrary to what you may have heard, this project is NOT a done deal, so it's important that we hear from you and as many citizens as possible. On **January 31**, the final route recommendation will be presented at the CRTPA Board meeting for a vote by the CRTPA members. That meeting is open to the public and will begin at **5:30 at City Hall**.

The Citizens North Monroe Corridor Task Force



The Citizens North Monroe Corridor Task Force was a <u>County appointed focus group</u> that spent about six months looking at key issues of crime, homelessness and improvements on the North Monroe Street Corridor from Fred George Road to Tharpe Street. I'm very thankful to the task force members, members of the public, and the Planning Department staff for the time and effort they invested in this effort.

Northwood Redevelopment Community Meeting



The City of Tallahassee will host a community meeting on **January 20th** to engage residents in the Northwood Centre's redevelopment. The meeting will be held at the **Tallahassee Senior Center (1400 North Monroe Street) from 6-7:30 p.m.**

Construction of the new Tallahassee Police Department (TPD) headquarters facility is a key component within the redevelopment of the Northwood Centre. Additionally, the site presents opportunities for green space, community amenities and other economic development projects. Community input is needed to determine how this space evolves to best serve residents. The City will use this input to aid in the development of a long-term master plan for the parcel.

Recognizing the opportunity to reinvigorate this once-vibrant site, the City Commission approved the City to participate in the property's auction. As a result, the 29.5-acre parcel was purchased in April 2019. At the time of purchase, the City was in the middle of the site selection process for the future headquarters facility for the Tallahassee Police Department. Through that process, the Northwood Centre location was recommended by technical experts and the majority of the public who provided input due to its central location, accessibility and size, and it was ultimately selected unanimously by the Commission.

As a County Commissioner I will not be voting on this redevelopment project but since it's located in County District 3, I'm very interested and am planning to attend the Jan. 20th meeting. I hope you can join us and share your thoughts.

Blueprint Vote on Doak Campbell Stadium









At the Dec. 9th Blueprint IA Meeting, one of the agenda items was a bond issuance that, among other things, included \$20 million for FSU's Doak Campbell stadium infrastructure repairs.

Initially I supported this allocation. FSU is a vital partner with this community and the economic benefits of Doak Campbell stadium renovations are significant.

However, Leon County residents made it clear they want to see Blueprint's limited economic development funds invested in other ways. For every person who contacted me in support of the stadium funding, I heard from 25 others who were steadfastly against it.

Although I voted against the funding of this project that night, the Board's full vote was 7-5 in favor of proceeding. Final approval of the bond financing will take place at the next Blueprint IA Meeting on Thursday, February 24th. Leon County Opens New Hazardous Waste Drop-Off Site on Blair Stone Road



Continuing its commitment to protecting the environment, Leon County opened a first-of-its-kind Household Hazardous Waste drop-off location at **1800 N. Blair Stone Road.** The new, centrally located site will supplement collections at established sites like the Solid Waste Facility (7550 Apalachee Pkwy) and the Ft. Braden, Woodville and Miccosukee Rural Waste Service Centers.

Citizens are encouraged to access the new site when staff is monitoring from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday. I used it myself a few days ago, in fact -- I dropped off a lot of old batteries and a few broken electronics. As the first-of-its-kind, the site hours will be updated over time to reflect usage trends.

Household Hazardous Waste sites, including the new drop-off location, allow citizens to dispose of household objects that may become dangerous to the environment or humans when disposed of improperly. This includes items such as cooking oil, paints, household chemicals, lightbulbs, batteries and small electronics. Visit LeonCountyFl.gov/HHW to find a full list of items that can be dropped off.

Last year alone, Leon County recycled over 600,000 pounds of potentially hazardous material collected from over 15,000 residents and small businesses. Compared to 2020, this was an 80% increase of hazardous waste material collected. The addition of a new drop-off will expand access and meet the rising community need for hazardous waste collection.

Due to certain limitations of the new drop-off location, some items are currently not accepted. This includes flammables, appliances, tools, biohazardous waste or medical waste. Update on Lake Jackson

As you've likely heard, Lake Jackson is experiencing a dry down event, during which part of the lake naturally and cyclically drains into a sinkhole. The dry down is attracting many visitors who are curious to see this natural phenomenon.

If you are planning to visit Lake Jackson, please take precautions and stay safe. DEP has <u>created an FAQ</u> about the dry down. Faulk Landing has been a bird-watching hot-spot, particularly during the dry down. Naturalists can stay up to date on flora and fauna observations on <u>eBird</u> and iNaturalist.

A few items to note:

- Foot traffic is permitted; however, visitors to Faulk Landing and the sinkhole area should use caution. Sinkholes and swallets (small flowing streams) are unmarked, and footing is unpredictable. Visitors should not go down into the sinkhole or remaining pools because the sediment may collapse along the sinkhole walls and the lake bottom sediments are unstable.
- All fishing, hunting and boating regulations are still in effect, and are administered and enforced by the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).
 Fishing and hunting are allowed in the remaining water bodies of the lake and launching vessels is permitted at designated public boat landings.
- Lake-bottom driving with any motorized vehicle is prohibited and strictly enforced.

Historically, heavy rain caused water to run over Meridian Road and created hazardous conditions in the area. To reduce flooding, Leon County improved drainage by installing large box culverts to move water beneath the roadway. Such improvements are also expected to reduce soil erosion, improving the health of adjacent wetlands and Lake Jackson.

Leon County Launches New Downtown Heritage Trail with Guided Community Walk

The approximately 0.8-mile walk -- the first trail in the series -- connects more than a dozen important sites, including the Knott House, The Riley House Center & Museum, Smokey Hollow, and the old Walker Library.

In addition to the Downtown Heritage Trail, more trails are planned for the ongoing Heritage Trails Program. Future trails will focus on a wide assortment of subjects, such as civil rights, music and more. The Heritage Trails are designed to promote exploration through mapped routes that engage residents and visitors to learn more about the area's people, places and events.
