Maintenance Along Meridian Road



**Please Note: the following is a City of Tallahassee project, but we wanted to keep District 3 neighbors informed in case they hadn't heard about it.

Proactive sewer work to line pipes along Meridian Road from Piedmont Drive to Seventh Avenue is underway. This will help ensure the reliability and fortitude of the City's sewer service.

Work begins this week and is anticipated to take four weeks to complete, barring any adverse weather conditions. The crew will work in roughly 400-feet sections each day along the roadway, moving south to north from Seventh Avenue to Piedmont Drive. Work hours will primarily be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

While traffic will be maintained in both directions, the center turn lane will be closed near the active work zone. Motorists are urged to slow down near work zones to enhance crew safety.

Along the two-lane portion of the road from Seventh Avenue to Tharpe Street, it will be necessary to close one travel lane. Two-way traffic will be maintained via a flag operation. Work hours will shift to overnight from 7:30 p.m. to 5 a.m. Direct outreach will be done to nearby residents.

Created Equal: A Conversation about Race in our Elections



Join The Village Square and Leon County Government for a conversation that examines how national and statewide perspectives on voting access and security impact our local community.

As a cornerstone of American democracy, there is a fundamental link between trust in election infrastructure and equal access to the ballot box. In recent years, more than 400 voter security bills have been introduced in 48 states. Yet according to experts, measures such as strict voter ID laws, restricted registration, and narrowed voting times disproportionately impact people of color, students, the elderly, and people with disabilities.

Are elections fair and secure for everyone? Should we be doing more? This year's *Created Equal* program will address this question by connecting academic experts, community members, and advocates to look at voter security and the right for all people to vote. The discussion will encourage residents to advocate for voter engagement among family, friends, and within our community.

Leon County Launches New Texting Program to Schedule Inspections and More



To better serve citizens, Leon County Government launched Text-to-Inspect, a service that allows contractors to utilize text messaging to schedule, reschedule, or cancel inspections and obtain inspection results on their Leon County building permits.

To get started, users can send text commands, like "Schedule" or "Results," to 855-927-1525. Through this program, builders can find results for HVAC changeout, drywall, mechanical ductwork, and much more. In addition to texting, developers can continue to schedule inspections or obtain results via phone by calling 850-606-1306, or by visiting the Tallahassee-Leon County Permit Portal at <u>TLCPermits.org</u>.

Text-to-Inspect is one of many digital services provided by Leon County to deliver professional, helpful, and value-added engagement to the community. Other services include the Leon County ROKU channel that provides Leon County updates and live coverage of all commission meetings, and the Text-to-911 program that allows residents to text 9-1-1 in emergency situations when calling is not an option.

This training applies to workplaces of all kinds including hotels, restaurants, shops, convenience stores, offices, financial institutions and more. In just under an hour, you'll learn how to recognize and respond to suspected human trafficking happening here in Leon County, and you'll receive a downloadable certificate acknowledging your completion of the course.


The goal of the Leon Works Expo is to help bridge the skilled jobs gap by teaching

REfire Culinary



Rick recently had the opportunity to tour REfire Culinary, founded by Rebecca Kelly-Manders (center in the photo above).

REfire is a culinary training program for people with felony convictions, providing basic skills training, job experience and job placement support. The curriculum is developed by professional chefs and culinary educators and will prepare graduates to fill a significant talent gap in Tallahassee's retail food sector.

A criminal conviction history can make it extremely difficult for ex-felons to get jobs. But without a job, the recidivism rate skyrockets, meaning those ex-felons reoffend and end up back in prison, putting a further burden on the economy and taxpayers. Ex-felons need job skills training and the opportunity to re-enter the workforce and become skilled and productive members of their community.

In addition to providing critical job skills training, REfire staff and students operate a community-focused catering company that provides quality food products at reduced cost to schools, housing facilities, and elderly meal programs.


