2023 Leon County Annual Report Now Available



In 2023, Leon County Government continued to make great progress and serve our citizens, all while striving to set the standard for performance, fiscal stewardship, and best practices for local governments everywhere.

While addressing the critical needs of the citizens we serve, we remained focused on executing our long-term strategy of building and diversifying our local economy by opening Amazon, which brings more than 1,300 full-time jobs to our community and \$114 million annually in local economic impact.

Thanks to our continuous efforts to grow our local tourism economy, we had another record year, with \$1.23 billion in economic impact and nearly 2.35 million visitors. To keep this historic momentum going, we opened the County's one-of-a-kind Visitor Information Center downtown in the renovated rail station that will grow tourism and support the County's leading efforts in celebrating our community's Bicentennial in 2024.

And we did this and so much more in 2023, never losing focus of our ambitious targets and bold goals for the organization and the community, including growing our local tourism economy, addressing pressing issues like homelessness and hunger, protecting our precious environment, and so much more.

Through the vision and leadership provided by the Board of County Commissioners and the hard work of our dedicated County employees, we at Leon County remain committed to listening to the people we serve, addressing the challenges we face together, and striving to be a place like nowhere else.

Leon County obtains approval for two policy

priorities at Florida Association of Counties' Legislative Conference



Each year, the Florida Association of Counties (FAC) develops its statewide policy priorities for the upcoming legislative session. County Commissioners from around the state convene to debate the issues and form a consensus on legislative policies that will benefit their constituents.

At the FAC Legislative Conference in Tampa last month, Rick spearheaded the development of and obtained unanimous approval for two policy proposals:

- 1. an anti-human trafficking proposal that would require state and local government contractors to attest that their operations do not involve human trafficking, and
- a housing proposal, developed in close partnership with Alachua County Commissioner Ken Cornell and Director of Community Support Services Claudia Tuck, that would increase the flexibility for counties to use SHIP funds for rental properties and rental assistance.

These two policies are now part of FAC's 2024 legislative agenda. Already Rick has had encouraging discussions with Rep. Allison Tant (HD9) and Sen. Corey Simon (SD3) about the anti-human trafficking proposal, and he'll be joining FAC to advocate for both items during session.

On December 31, 2003, Leon County EMS began providing lifesaving care to the people of Leon County. Twenty years later, our EMS team has completed 775,000 calls for service and transported more than 500,000 patients.

North Monroe Business Crime Watch Networks



Over the past few months, Rick has partnered with the Leon County Sheriff's Office to host three breakfast meetings for businesses and neighbors along the North Monroe corridor.

The goals of these meetings were:

- To establish three North Monroe business crime watch networks with all businesses and nonprofits located on or near the area.
- To provide these businesses with an update on crime in their area, and how we can work with them to keep their customers and employees safe. This includes cracking down on human trafficking, which is a serious problem for this section of North Monroe and which contributes to other types of criminal activity.
- To provide an update on homelessness, and how we can help people on the street find safe, stable housing.

Sheriff Walt McNeil and his team, Property Appraiser Akin Akinyemi and his team, representatives from TPD, and STAC Executive Director Robin Hassler Thompson attended as well.

Leon County Celebrates Three Home Replacements and Welcomes Families Home



This month, Leon County Government welcomed three families to their new homes during Home Replacement Housewarming Ceremonies. During the ceremonies, each family received keys to their new homes as well as other housewarming gifts. The homes were replaced through the Leon County Housing Services Home Replacement Program with State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) funds.

The three original homes had significant deficiencies, including collapsing floors, leaking roofs and fixtures, ineffective plumbing and electrical systems, and asbestos. In instances where the costs associated with rehabilitation are expected to exceed 50% of the current value of the home, home replacement becomes a viable option. Due to the extent of the damage, Leon County Housing Services staff determined that it would be best to replace the original homes with new site-built, single-family homes. Home replacement is a comprehensive way to maintain the existing supply of affordable housing while allowing families to continue living in the communities they love.

Located in unincorporated Leon County, the homes were built using a portion of the County's \$1.1 million fiscal year 2024 SHIP allocation. In addition to home replacements, the funding supports Leon County Housing Services programs including down payment assistance for first time homebuyers and housing repair, rehabilitation, and replacement.

Rick was pleased to participate in the District 3 ceremony.

"It's heartwarming to see these families settling into their upgraded, livable homes," said Rick. "This program goes beyond just housing; it's about preserving the very essence of our neighborhoods and strengthening the fabric of our community."

Leon County Housing Services is committed to providing safe, sanitary, and affordable housing to low-income residents in the unincorporated areas of Leon County. Leon County Housing Services reviews applications, verifies applicant eligibility, and ensures compliance with the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) program, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), and other programs.

Adopt-A-Tree



Leon County is proud to offer the 2024 Adopt-A-Tree Program. Applications are now being accepted through January 31, 2024, on a first-come, first-served basis. If you live inside Leon County but outside of Tallahassee city limits, you may qualify to have a tree planted on your property for free. With a goal of planting 200 trees in honor of the Tallahassee-Leon County bicentennial in 2024, Leon County is encouraging residents to be a part of this green endeavor.


Residents will have the option to have a tree delivered to their residence for planting at their convenience. This project provides an enjoyable and educational experience for the entire family, and comprehensive instructions for tree planting and care will be provided upon tree delivery. For those who prefer assistance with tree planting, County staff is available to assist upon request; just choose the "delivery and plant" option.

If you agree to water the tree three times a week for one year, Leon County will plant the tree anywhere between your house and any publicly maintained road or any privately maintained road with public access.

Old Bainbridge Water Main Replacement




In line with its commitment to providing best-in-class utility services, the City of Tallahassee is gathering information related to the replacement of potable water infrastructure within portions of the Old Bainbridge Road corridor between Tharpe Road and Fred George Road. The purpose of this project is to replace approximately 9,000 linear feet of water mains as well as valves, fire hydrants, water services and meter settings. This investment will improve the City's ability to continue to provide safe, reliable drinking water and fire protection.

The City has contracted with a design consultant to design these improvements, and the land surveyor that is a part of the consultant's team, SS&A, has been in the area since July 31, 2023, collecting data such as right-of-way and utility easement boundaries; location, size, and depth of existing utilities; location of physical improvements within the right-of-way/easements; and topographic information. The initial survey is nearly complete; however additional survey work, including obtaining the location and size of trees that may be impacted by the project, is anticipated.

NOTE: Rick has spoken with City staff, who have said that the water main piping will be installed under the road itself to ensure the protection of the canopy road. To improve fire safety for the neighborhoods along Old Bainbridge, the City will be adding some fire hydrants in the rights of way but the impact on the canopy will be minimized.

Once this water project is complete, the County will be scheduling an Old Bainbridge resurfacing project for 2025.

Volunteer Opportunity with the Big Bend Community of Care


