On January 13, 2010, the Development Review Committee (DRC) voted to continue the referenced application to the April 7, 2010 DRC meeting (special meeting date). The applicant was notified at the January 13, 2010 DRC meeting that revised documents, addressing the deficiencies found in the November 18, 2009 DRC staff report, must be submitted by the end of the work day on March 17, 2010.

As of the date of this memorandum, the applicant has not submitted any revised documents to Development Services addressing the deficiencies noted in the DRC staff report. Environmental Compliance has also provided a memorandum dated March 19, 2010, stating that they have not received any new material since the November 18, 2009 DRC meeting addressing the deficiencies relating to the Environmental Impact Analysis (EIA). Therefore, Development Services is providing this memorandum to update you on the status of this application and provide you with our recommendation.

November 18, 2009 DRC Staff Report Analysis:

At the November 18, 2009 DRC meeting, staff provided the applicant with a staff report that outlined the deficiencies in the application. The November 18, 2009 DRC staff report provided multiple findings which detailed the deficiencies in the application in regards to the applicable requirements in the Leon County Land Development Code (LDC). More specifically, the DRC staff report stated that the application has failed to address Findings 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, 11 and 12 of the report. The November 18, 2009 DRC report is attached to this memorandum for reference. The application did include an approved (with conditions) utility concept plan, approved by the City of Tallahassee on November 10, 2009. However, one of the conditions of the utility concept plan approval was the requirement of the applicant to complete a Utility Letter of Agreement between the applicant and the utility provider (City of Tallahassee). As of today, staff has not received any documentation which

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demonstrates that this utility agreement has been finalized.
For your convenience, the findings in the November 18, 2009 DRC staff report which identified deficiencies in the application are found below:

Finding #3: Compliance with Article III, Land Development Code, Concurrency Management System Implementation Requirements. The proposed amendment shall include documentation from Concurrency Management that the concurrency has been addressed.

Comments: The applicant received a preliminary certificate of traffic concurrency for the proposed development on October 14, 2009. The preliminary certificate will expire on January 14, 2010. The application is also subject to addressing school concurrency. A completed School Impact Analysis form (Attachment #2,) which was received by the Department on November 14, 2009, indicates that the proposed development will create a significant impact on the Leon County School system. Please refer to the Preliminary Certificate of Traffic Concurrency in Attachment #3 of the DRC staff report.

The application has reduced the total number of residential dwelling units, and the revised site plan submittal includes two (2) non-residential lots which are anticipated to reduce the total number of vehicle miles traveled by the residents of the proposed development. Additionally, it is anticipated that the addition of commercial to the development plan will increase internal capture of project trips that would typically travel off-site for similar goods and services planned to be provided onsite. Furthermore, staff anticipates that the development would also benefit from having access to passive recreation amenities within the proposed development, which would be expected to further enhance the opportunity for internal capture of the developments trips onsite, thereby potentially further reducing the proposed project's off-site traffic impact.

Compliance Deficiencies:

- a. A transportation concurrency mitigation agreement has not been finalized to address the applicant's proportionate share mitigation costs for the proposed development's off-site traffic impacts.
- b. The applicant has not provided documentation which addresses school concurrency deficiencies. A school concurrency mitigation agreement, which addresses the impacts on the school district, between the applicant and the Leon County School Board has not been finalized and/or approved by the School Board.

Finding #4: Compliance with Article IV, Land Development Code, Environmental Management. The Environmental Compliance Division of the Department of Growth and Environmental Management has reviewed the application to determine whether the amended site and development plan will comply with the Environmental Management provisions of the Code, with regard to potential development impacts upon natural features and environmentally sensitive resources.

Comments: The Natural Features Inventory (NFI) for the application was conditionally approved on October 8, 2009. The conditions of NFI approval have been satisfied as of the date of this report. An Environmental Impact Analysis (EIA) is also required for this application. As of the date of this report, the application's EIA has not received approval or approval with conditions from the County. The EIA shall be approved or approved with conditions prior to forwarding the proposed development plan to the BCC for consideration.

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It should be noted that subsequent to EIA approval, the applicant will be required to apply for and obtain an Environmental Management Permit (EMP) prior to the commencement of any development activity should the development receive final approval from the BCC. For additional information on compliance with the Article IV, please refer to comments from the Environmental Compliance Division included in Attachment #4.

Compliance Deficiencies:

- a. *As noted above and outlined in Attachment #4, the applicant has not received EIA approval as of the date of this report. EIA approval is required prior to finding the application complete and forwarding to the BCC for final disposition.*

Finding #5: Compliance with the Urban Fringe Zoning District & Conservation Subdivision Regulations, Sections 10-6.613 and 10-7.204 of the LDC. The Urban Fringe zoning district is intended to provide for low-intensity development that can be accommodated without a full complement of urban services and infrastructure. The district is primarily intended to allow low density residential of no greater than one unit on three acres of land, agricultural, and silviculture activities.

Pursuant to Section 10-7.204, conservation subdivisions are allowed in the UF district. Conservation subdivision design is encouraged to advance environmental resource protection or restoration by analyzing the development parcel so as to locate and coordinate appropriate areas for development and conservation. Such development shall permanently set aside preservation features and canopy road protection zones and, to the greatest extent practicable, other functional open space and sensitive natural resources.

Conservation subdivisions shall be reviewed and authorized pursuant to the site and development plan review and approval procedure provisions of Division 4, Article VII of Chapter 10 of the LDC. In addition to submittals required for appropriate review under other provision of the LDC, pursuant to Section 10-7.204(c)(1), the following submittals shall also be required:

- a) A land preservation plan, showing all existing vegetation and proposed changes and new planting, if any; and,
- b) A geographic features and land use map of all land within 500 feet of the site that shall indicate floodplains, area hydrography, publicly or privately managed parks or preserves, and adopted or proposed greenways.

Conservation subdivisions shall be made up of two distinct areas: the reserve area and the development area. Pursuant to Section 10-7.204(f)(1), the reserve area shall comprise no less than 50% of the total parcel and shall be contiguous and continuous to the greatest extent practicable with other portions of the site including the reserve area. The reserve area shall be placed under a permanent easement that runs with the land. Subject to approval by the county, the easement may be assigned to the local government or to an existing land trust that is a 501(c)(3) organization for which conservation of resources is a principal goal and which can provide reasonable assurance it has the financial and staff resources to monitor and manage the easement.

Pursuant to Section 10-7.204(f)(2), the development area shall include that portion of the parcel proposed for development at the density established for the land use category and base zoning applicable to the subject property. The development area shall be located on the least environmentally or otherwise significant portions

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of the total conservation subdivision parcel in accordance with the applicable provisions of Section 10-7.204(f)(1) paraphrased above. The development area shall comprise no more than 50% of the total conservation subdivision parcel; be contiguous and configured in such a manner as to not adversely interfere with continued farming or silviculture uses in the reserve area; and allow maximum open space to be easily maintained in the reserve area.

Comments: The application proposes subdivision of the subject site into 498 residential lots to accommodate single-family detached dwelling units (the applicant is not proposing the construction of the dwelling units in conjunction with this application), two (2) non-residential lots (the applicant is not proposing the construction of commercial retail buildings in conjunction with this application), supporting infrastructure (streets and stormwater facilities) and open space areas, which are intended to provide an aesthetic amenity within the developed portion of the site.

The application proposes placing approximately 61% of the site, which contains environmentally sensitive areas, in conservation and developing the remaining 39% of the site unencumbered with environmental constraints. Based on the proposed number of residential lots (498) and the acreage eligible for development (697.1 acres), the application proposes a gross density of 1.39 acres per dwelling unit, which complies with the allowable gross density limits of 1.33 acres per dwelling unit for conservation subdivisions in the UF zoning district.

Sheet 4.0 of the site plan provides a note proposing that the conservation easements shall inure to Leon County (43 acres) and the Florida Wildlife Commission (385 acres) and shall be owned by the Chason Woods Home Owner's Association (HOA). The 385 acre tract which is proposed to be encumbered with a conservation easement in favor of the Florida Wildlife Commission presents 55% of the total tract, and demonstrates compliance with the conservation subdivision provisions of the LDC, specifically with the 50% set-aside provision and the non-profit provisions for the designated land management entity. The note also states that Entrix Environmental, Inc. will be the designated Land Management Company. The application proposes to designate the Chason Woods HOA as the responsible management entity, responsible for funding and implementing the land management plan.

Compliance Deficiencies:

- a. *Section 10-7.204(d) of the LDC states that minimum lot sizes for conservation subdivisions shall consist of no less than 0.5 acre in size in the UF zoning district. The site and development plan as submitted to the County proposes lots as small as 0.24 acres and, therefore, does not comply with this standard. However, the applicant, in a previous submittal, requested a deviation to reduce the 0.5 acre minimum lot size requirement by 0.25 acres to establish a minimum requirement of 0.25 acres for a portion of the proposed development. The applicant's request for this deviation is considered in conjunction with this application, but requires separate findings, recommendation, and motion by the Board of County Commissioners (BCC). The Department's analysis of the requested deviation is addressed in a separate portion of this report.*
- b. *The application proposes several lots that consist of approximately 0.24 acres (shown on Sheets 4.8 and 4.9 of the site plan). These lots would not comply with the minimum lot size requirement of Section 10-7.204(d) of the LDC (0.50 acres), nor would they be consistent with the requested deviation from development standards. Therefore, the application shall be revised to increase the 0.24 acre lot sizes to 0.50 acres to comply with Section 10-7.204(d) of the LDC or, at minimum, be*

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- revised to be consistent with the requested deviation from development standards.*
- c. *The application does not provide a land preservation plan as required in Section 10-7.204(c). A land preservation plan shall be provided to staff and shall be approved prior to final site and development plan review. Additionally, the application also does not provide information for reasonable assurance that the designated organization has the financial and staff resources to monitor and manage the reserve area.*

Finding #6: Buffer Zone Standards, Section 10-7.522 of the LDC.

A buffer zone is a landscaped strip between adjacent land uses that is intended to serve a screening function, as well as, provide an attractive boundary between parcels. The width or degree of vegetation within a buffer zone depends on the type of land use(s) on adjacent parcels. The required widths and degree of vegetation plantings for all buffers are outlined in this section.

Comments: According to the buffer chart found in Section 10-7.522, the proposed development will require a Type "A" buffer along the perimeter of the site adjacent to properties zoned Residential Preservation (RP) and developed with single-family homes. The site plan provides a Type "A" buffer along a portion of the perimeter of the site adjacent to RP zoned and residentially developed lots. Please also refer to any additional comments from Environmental Compliance in Attachment #4 of the DRC staff report.

Compliance Deficiencies:

The revised site and development plan does not provide a Type "A" buffer along a portion of the northern perimeter of the site adjacent to lots developed with single-family homes, and therefore, does not comply with this standard. Additionally, a Type "A" buffer shall be provided between the proposed Stormwater Management Facility "I" and the perimeter of the site.

Finding #9: Compliance with General Layout and Design Standards, Section 10-7.502 of the LDC. The proposed plan of development shall comply with the general layout and design standards in this section. This includes streets, driveways, lots and lot designs, stormwater management areas, pedestrian and bikeways and facilities, proposed utility locations and easements, public/private street designations, utility systems and protection of natural features.

Comments: In regard to other aspects of compliance with Section 10-7.502(b)(2) of the LDC, and consistent with past practices and administrative protocols, the Department of Growth and Environmental Management defers analysis of dimensional requirements for infrastructure to the Department of Public Works. Please refer to the comments from that Department provided in Attachment #5 of the DRC staff report.

Compliance Deficiencies: *The site and development plan shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in the attached memorandum from Leon County Public Works prior to finding the application complete.*

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Finding #11: Compliance with Standards for Plats, Section 10-7.601 and 10-7.610 of the LDC. No building permit shall be issued for a project that requires platting until a plat has been accepted and approved by the Board of County Commissioners and recorded in the plat books of the County. Pursuant to this Section:

1. A plat must be submitted not more than 36 months after the date on which the site and development plan was approved.
2. The Planning Department or Growth Management Department shall notify the developer in writing whether the plat, as submitted, conforms to the approved site and development plan.
3. The developer or representative shall then submit the original plat to the county engineer in a manner to allow for the review of any easements, design standards, and requirements of applicable county codes.

Comments: Should this application be approved, the property owner/applicant shall be required to complete required steps for platting prior to the sale of any lot or parcel. Annotation shall be provided on the site plan affirming the applicant's acknowledgment of this requirement. Therefore, until the annotation has been added to the site and development plan, the application has not demonstrated compliance with this Section.

Section 10-7.610 of the LDC sets out a standard that requires applications proposing common or shared infrastructure systems to have maintenance agreements, or, in the case of proposed residential subdivisions, such documents as covenants, articles of incorporation, and by-laws for the homeowner's association, to be reviewed by the County Attorney's Office for form (to ensure that appropriate mechanisms are established to address maintenance and responsibility for the infrastructures).

Compliance Deficiencies:

- a. The site and development plan shall be revised to provide annotation affirming the owner's/applicant's acknowledgement of the requirement to complete the platting process prior to final approval of the site and development plan.
- b. The application contains areas not dedicated to the public; therefore, pursuant to Section 10-7.610, the application shall provide a draft of the proposed covenants and restrictions for this development to Development Services. The application does not comply with this standard as it does not include a copy of the proposed covenants and restrictions. The Leon County Attorney must approve the proposed covenants and restrictions as to form prior to final site plan approval.

Finding #12: Compliance with Other Regulations Applicable to Site and Development Plan Applications. The application shall address any other applicable deficiencies as well as the comments and deficiencies of other technical staff reviewers.

Compliance Deficiencies:

The application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted by the Tallahassee Fire Department in Attachment #6 of the DRC staff report.

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Findings Pertaining to the Applicant's Request for a Deviation from Development Standards - Minimum Lot Size Requirement in the Urban Fringe Zoning District

Finding #D1: Deviation from Development Standards, Section 10-1.106(c) of the LDC. The entity with the authority to approve, approve with conditions, or deny a site and development plan (the Board of County Commissioners in this instance) may grant a deviation under this section only upon demonstration that:

1. The deviation will not be detrimental to the public's health, safety, or welfare or to the surrounding properties; and
2. There are exceptional topographic, soil, or other environmental conditions unique to the property; or
3. There are unusual conditions which are not ordinarily found in the area; or
4. The deviation requested would provide a creative or innovative design alternative to substantive standards and criteria; or
5. The strict application of the requirements of this ordinance will constitute a substantial hardship to the applicant; and,
6. The granting of the deviation is consistent with the intent and purpose of this ordinance and the comprehensive plan.

Comments: The BCC is obligated to review the deviation requests accompanying site and development plan applications. The BCC may approve the request only after finding that the request satisfies the criteria of Section 10-1.106 of the LDC. Should the BCC find that the request does not satisfy Section 10-1.106, then the application would be presumed not to comply with that Section of the LDC and the deviation request should be denied..

Finding #D2: Applicant's Requested Lot Size Deviation - Description. The applicant requests deviation from the minimum lot size requirement of the UF zoning district development standards (Section 10-6.637). The applicant's request is outlined below:

Comments: Pursuant to Section 10-7.204(d) of the Leon County Land Development Code (LDC), the minimum lot size for conservation subdivisions within the Urban Fringe (UF) zoning district shall consist of no less than 0.50 acres. The applicant's revised site and development plan resubmittal proposes lot sizes consisting of 0.24 acres or larger. The applicant submitted a request for a deviation from development standards on September 23, 2009, to decrease the minimum lot size requirement by 0.25 acres, resulting in a minimum lot size requirement of 0.25 acres. The applicant's deviation request does not address or allow if approved the 0.24 acre lot sizes noted on the revised site and development plan that was submitted to the County for review.

Finding #D3: Applicant's Requested Lot Size Deviation - Compliance with Applicable Criteria. To obtain approval, the applicant's request must demonstrate compliance with the criteria set out in Section 10-1.106, specifically #1, that the deviation would not be detrimental to the public's health, safety, or welfare; #6, the deviation would be consistent with the intent and purpose of the ordinance providing for deviations and consistent with the Comprehensive Plan; and any one of the other four criteria (#2 - #5).

Comments: Policy 2.2.2 of the Comprehensive Plan describes the Urban Fringe future land use category, which includes the subject site, and establishes the general land use types and intensities allowable within the

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affected area. This policy provides that conservation subdivisions shall be allowed in the UF district if the development is density neutral, permanently sets aside 50% of the total parcel as open space and restricts development to the least environmentally sensitive and otherwise significant portions of the land. The Comprehensive Plan does not address minimum lot size requirements in the UF future land use category. The conservation subdivision provision of the LDC (Sec. 10-7.204) provides specific development standards, including minimum lot size requirements for applications proposing conservation subdivisions. Section 10-7.204(d) requires that the minimum lot size for applications proposing conservation subdivision in the UF district shall be no less than 0.50 acres. The maximum density allowed in a conservation subdivision shall be one dwelling unit per 1.33 gross acres of the total parcel.

In an effort to obtain up to the maximum allowed density that could be achieved pursuant to the conservation subdivision provisions for the UF zoning district, the applicant proposes to develop a majority of the site (approximately 89% of the developable area) with 0.25 acre lots, with the remainder of the proposed lots consisting of 0.50 acres or more. Based on the total acreage, the applicant could theoretically be allowed to develop up to 524 residential lots (697 acres/1.33=524 units), provided the applicant receives approval of the requested deviation to the minimum lot size. Clearly, to obtain the maximum density provided for in the Comprehensive Plan and the LDC, a deviation from the conservation subdivision lot size development standard would be required. The effect of requiring a deviation to obtain the maximum density set out in the Comprehensive Plan, as opposed to making it "automatic," functions as a check mechanism, to ensure that the proposed development will not be likely to create an adverse impact that could otherwise result from the smaller minimum lot size.

Pursuant to Policy 1.2.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Element of the Comprehensive Plan, developments proposing the use of onsite septic systems for sewage disposal would be required to provide lot sizes consisting of no less than 1/2 acre. In addition, developments located outside the Urban Service Area in the UF district are not generally anticipated to have access to central sanitary sewer and central potable water service. However, the applicant in this instance is proposing to extend central sanitary sewer and central potable water service to the site, potentially enabling the development of lots consisting of less than 1/2 acre. The applicant has provided documentation from the City of Tallahassee regarding their ability to serve the development with both sewer and water service, and has approved a utility concept plan indicating the extension of central sewer service to the site (Attachment #7).

The connection of the proposed development to the City of Tallahassee's central sanitary sewer system would result in less nitrogen particulates in the groundwater system on a per dwelling unit basis than would an onsite septic system. Both staff and the County's Science Advisory Committee (SAC) believe central sewer is the preferred alternative, especially with the City's financial commitment to modifying their wastewater treatment plant to Advanced Wastewater Treatment (AWT) standards, which will reduce the nitrogen output to 3 mg/l. Standard septic systems have a loading of 30-50 mg/l of nitrogen. Replacing these systems with central sewer service at AWT standards would provide a significant nitrogen loading reduction. Where central sewer service is currently not available in the primary springs protection area (the Chason Woods proposal is located in this area), the Board is considering requiring Performance Based Septic (PBS) Systems (denitrifying systems), which could potentially reduce the nitrogen loading down to 10 mg/l at the exit of the tank. However, the technology and testing for these systems have shown problems with meeting the reported 10 mg/l requirement. Realistically, the PBS systems may reach nitrogen loadings of 15 to 20 mg/l. Therefore, it would appear that the central sewer option may still be the best option available for reducing nitrogen output

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for the disposal of waste water associated with the proposed development. However, it should be noted that there is no formal study projecting mass balance for the future. The SAC analyzed the PBS systems in conjunction with their review of the springs protection Comprehensive Plan amendment that would require them, and found that the preferred alternative was central sewer service followed by the PBS systems. The SAC estimated if standard septic systems are allowed versus central sewer, the rate of loading would be much higher due to the differential mentioned above.

With regard to the issue of precedence, it should be noted that deviations to a lot size within a conservation subdivision has only occurred on one other occasion, in the Talquin Meadows Conservation Subdivision located in western Leon County near Lake Talquin. In that particular instance, a deviation was granted to a very small percentage (26%) of the total lots proposed in the development, and allowed only a 37.5% decrease in the applicable minimum lot size requirement. The proposed Chason Woods application requests a deviation to 89% of the total lots and a 50% reduction in the applicable minimum lot size requirement. Without the deviation, the applicant may still be able to potentially develop up to 214 residential dwelling units on 0.50 acre lots utilizing the conservation subdivision provision. Otherwise, the applicant could develop the site using the standard subdivision process, which would require a 3.0 acre minimum lot size, potentially allowing up to 142 residential dwelling units, outside environmental constraints. Any recommendation regarding the deviation proposed for the Chason Woods application should be considered in light of its future precedent and at minimum be justified based on the precedence of the deviation approved for Talquin Meadows development. This parameter was noted to the applicant subsequent to their Tech Staff review submittal; however, to date the applicant has not provided sufficient information in this regard.

Additionally, the proposed project is located in a very environmentally sensitive area of the county. Recent actions by the Board have memorialized this by formerly establishing the Woodville Springs Protection Area in the Comprehensive Plan with plans to provide for density transfers within the area and to require advanced treatment septic systems for all new development by 2010. Apart from the springs protection issues, aquifer protection is also a primary concern due to the karst features in this region of the County. Therefore, the established environmentally sensitive nature of the property and the area surrounding the proposed development would require that extensive environmental analysis be completed before a final recommendation and/or decision regarding the request for a deviation from the applicable minimum lot size requirement be tendered. As of the date of this report, this environmental analysis has not been completed.

Therefore, based on the above analysis and in consideration of the substantial public policy issues involved (central sewer extension, springs protection, and the potential precedence for future deviation requests), the Development Services Division is unable at this time to provide a recommendation regarding the proposed deviation from development standards request. The deviation will be readdressed subsequent to the applicant supplementing their previous submittal to specifically address the issues noted above. If the applicant is unable to sufficiently address and/or justify the deviation request, and based on the substantial public policy issues involved, Development Services staff will recommend that the Development Review Committee defer decision on this deviation request to the Board of County Commissioners.

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RECOMMENDATIONS

MINIMUM LOT SIZE DEVIATION RECOMMENDATION:

Based upon Findings D2-D3 above, the Development Services Division recommends that the Development Review Committee defer decision of this deviation request until the outstanding issues noted above have been specially addressed by the applicant in a resubmittal to the County.

SITE AND DEVELOPMENT PLAN RECOMMENDATION:

Based on the compliance deficiencies cited in findings 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, 11 and 12 above, the Development Services Division recommends that this application be continued to a date certain. The applicant shall revise the site and development plan to address the following deficiencies prior to further consideration by the DRC:

1. The site and development plan shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #3 of the staff report. More specifically, the applicant shall address the deficiencies noted in Findings #3a and #3b.
2. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #4 of the staff report. More specifically, the applicant shall provide documentation that demonstrates that the conditions of the Environmental Impact Analysis Amendment have been approved by the Environmental Compliance Division.
3. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #5 of the staff report. More specifically, the applicant shall address the deficiencies noted in Findings #5a, #5b and #5c.
4. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #6 of the staff report.
5. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #9 of the staff report.
6. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #11 of the staff report. More specifically, the applicant shall address the deficiencies noted in #11a and #11b.
7. The site and development plan application shall be revised to address the deficiencies noted in Finding #12 of the staff report. More specifically, the applicant shall address the deficiencies noted in #12a.
8. The site and development plan application shall be supplemented to demonstrate compliance with the outstanding issues noted in the findings and analysis provided with regard to the request for a deviation from development standards for the applicable minimum lot size requirement for the proposed development.

Preferred Design Alternative:

The application should be revised to provide for internal passive recreation opportunities to provide an additional amenity for the residents and to further facilitate the internal capture of the development's traffic and subsequent reduction in the project's anticipated off-site traffic impact.

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Growth & Environmental Management – Analysis and Recommendation for April 7, 2010:

The applicant was granted a continuance on January 13, 2010 at a special Development Review Committee meeting. The applicant was granted the additional time to address the numerous deficiencies and a deadline of March 17, 2010 was set by the DRC for the applicant to provide staff with a revised application addressing these deficiencies. As of the date of this memorandum, the applicant has not moved forward in an act of good faith to resolve these issues.

Therefore, as a result of the number of deficiencies identified in the original November 18, 2009 DRC staff report and due to the applicant's lack of a response to address the deficiencies in a timely manner, Growth and Environmental Management recommends to the DRC that this application be forwarded to the Board of County Commissioners with a recommendation for **denial for both the deviation request and for the site and development plan application.**

Findings:

- 1) The project is a proposed 498-unit residential conservation subdivision on 697 acres, with 2 proposed minor commercial parcels. The property is located on the east side of Wakulla Springs Road, approximately one-half mile south of Oak Ridge Road, and bordered on the south by County Line Road (Wakulla County).
- 2) The proposed project is located in the Wakulla Springs Primary Springs Protection Zone (PSPZ) and shall adhere to the requirements of Land Use Policy 2.2.2, which limits development types within the Urban Fringe FLUM category to conventional 3-acre lots or conservation subdivisions.
 - The code requires ½-acre lots in Urban Fringe conservation subdivisions; however, the Comprehensive Plan does not address lot size.
- 3) Utilities Element, Policy 1.2.1 (SS) limits lot sizes to ½-acre where sewer is not available.
- 4) Pursuant to Potable Water Policy 1.2.1 and Sanitary Sewer Policy 1.3.3, the applicant shall demonstrate that "at the time a development permit is issued, adequate facility capacity is available or will be available when needed to serve the development; or at the time a development order is issued, the necessary facilities and services are guaranteed in an enforceable development agreement."
 - The Applicant has provided materials from the City of Tallahassee Water Resources Engineering division that indicate the utility provider's ability to serve the subject site. The letter includes an attachment of an acceptable conceptual route and infrastructure capacity needed to serve Woodville Rural Community.
 - No formal agreement has been reached, and significant design and construction details must be finalized.

- The applicant must validate their ability and intent to extend master planned sewer, as noted in the attachment to Mr. John Buss' letter dated 9-21-09, to Woodville and the subject site prior to final site plan approval. This can be accomplished through a bond, letter of agreement, or other vehicle acceptable to the City of Tallahassee Utilities.
 - No such materials have been provided.
- 5) Land Use Policy 2.3.8 states that the open space component of Conservation Subdivisions shall be "placed under a permanent easement that runs with the land. Said easement may be assigned to (1) local government or (2) a local or national land trust that is a 501(c)(3) organization for which conservation of resources is a principal goal and which can provide reasonable assurance it has financial and staff resources to monitor and manage the easement in accordance with the intent of Objective 2.2 [L] and its supporting policies."
 - The applicant must provide documentation exhibiting compliance with the stated policy.
 - No such materials have been provided.
- 6) Land Use Policy 2.3.9 requires that conservation subdivision applications include a management plan for the dedicated open space.
 - The applicant must provide documentation exhibiting compliance with the stated policy.
 - No such materials have been provided.
- 7) A revision to the Sanitary Sewer sub-element occurred in the second cycle of the 2006 Comprehensive Plan Amendments. The result of the amendment is found in Policy 1.3.1 [SS] of the Tallahassee-Leon County Comprehensive Plan, which states, "for areas lying outside the Urban Service Area and within the Urban Fringe...central sanitary sewer service may be extended and/or provided by an existing utility provider." The extension must serve a conservation or clustered subdivision.

This provision is not without limitations, and later statements within the same Policy 1.3.1 qualify the extension to Urban Fringe areas.

- a) The policy requires "[a]ll costs of sewer line extensions, any necessary lift stations and on-site sewer infrastructure shall be borne by the developer as specified within the adopted *Water and Sewer Agreement* and shall be constructed to the standards specified within the *Agreement*."
 - b) Where the City of Tallahassee is the service provider other issues should be considered. "The City Manager and the County Administrator or their designees may agree that the connection of a development to central sewer is not economically feasible and may deny such requests to connect. Such cases may arise when considering lower density isolated developments, developments located in areas that are not environmentally sensitive, or developments that are not within a reasonable distance to existing infrastructure.
 - c) The numerous active karst features of this area – and their connections to groundwater and area springs – are a major impetus for sewer extension into Urban Fringe areas. "The City of Tallahassee shall place a higher priority upon serving areas that...may be determined to negatively impact the environmental quality of Wakulla Springs if developed with traditional septic tank systems."
- 8) The 2006 Infrastructure Phasing Report – accepted by the City Commission in November 2005 and the County Commission in January 2006 – recognizes that without sewer, the

Woodville Rural Community cannot obtain the envisioned economic opportunities or residential densities. It also recognizes the potential for further environmental degradation of Wakulla Springs due to continued development on septic systems.

- 9) New Comprehensive Plan, Conservation Element policies call for the creation of land development regulations that require the use of low impact development (LID) techniques within the PSPZ. Planning recommends using LID treatments for stormwater treatment.
 - The shared driveways, driveway ribbon paving, and narrow roadway cross sections are consistent with LID principles.

- 10) Sunflower Road is designated as a minor collector in the Comprehensive Plan, Transportation Element. An existing easement travels across the site and was intended for future extension of Sunflower Road to act as an east-west connector. Several aspects of County policy and code requirements reflect intent to provide adequate transportation infrastructure and capacity to avoid congestion. These passages include Transportation Policy 1.6.9 and 1.6.10, as well as Section 10-7.501(e)(2) and (3) and 10-7.502(a)(2) of the Land Development Code. Specifically, Policy 1.6.10 directs development to, "incorporate and continue all sub-arterial streets stubbed to the boundary of the development plan by...existing development." The Sunflower Road access easement runs across the subject site.
 - The applicant has redesigned the site to improve the connection to Sunflower Road, and it is built to minor collector standards. However, it is not designed as a true extension of the minor collector.

Preferred Design Alternative

1. The current Sunflower Road bisects private property and is not built to minor collector standards. The proposed Chason Marsh Road provides an opportunity to upgrade community infrastructure. Planning recommends that Chason Marsh Road be designed as a true extension of Sunflower Road, thereby avoiding future intersection reconfiguration construction costs.
2. Connect Gadwell Court to the southern termination of Freedom Road.
3. There are more than 10 residential curb cuts onto Chason Marsh Road (Sunflower Road Extension). Planning staff recommends limiting driveway access and reorienting the drive cuts to local roads, as Chason Marsh Road is designed as a minor collector.

Deviation to Development Standards:

Reduce minimum lot sizes in Conservation Subdivisions from ½-acre to ¼-acre.

(NOTE: Lots 2-6 of Block "BB" are less than ¼-acre, and Planning does not support lot sizes less than ¼-acre.)

Planning Department Response to Deviation Request:

As per Utilities Element, Policy 1.2.1 (SS), lot sizes are limited to ½-acre where sewer is not available. In order to obtain lots sizes less than ½-acre, sewer must be available. Sewer may be extended beyond the Urban Service Area (USA) if, pursuant to Policy 1.3.1 (SS) the sewer extension corrects documented environmental or health problems or serves new conservation subdivisions. The policy goes on to state that a higher priority is placed on serving areas that may be determined to negatively impact the environmental quality of Wakulla Springs if developed with septic tank systems. The Leon County Aquifer Vulnerability Assessment (LAVA) designates the project site as Most Vulnerable and More Vulnerable, which are the top two categories of vulnerability of four classifications (Most Vulnerable, More Vulnerable, Vulnerable, Less Vulnerable). Planning supports the deviation but recognizes that extension of central sewer to this site and the Woodville Rural Community area will raise issues beyond the scope of the DRC. These issues should be addressed by the Board prior to final action on the deviation.

Recommendation:

This application originally went before the DRC on November 18, 2009, at which time it was continued until January 13, 2010. The DRC, at its January 13, 2010 meeting, continued this item again, for 3 months, in order to allow the applicant a generous amount of time to provide additional information necessary to accurately analyze the application. The applicant has provided no new or revised materials. Continuances cause citizens to keep attending non-productive meetings, and further continuance would not be respectful of the citizens' time and effort to participate in the application review process. Therefore, the Planning Department recommends denial of the proposed site and development plan.

Public Works has not received any additional information from the applicant since the original DRC meeting November 18th meeting; therefore our previous memo dated November 17, 2009, stands as our official comments.

Ryan, here are my comments on the application, for the DRC's record:

The application warrants recommendation of denial, for many reasons. I list some immediately below and will provide additional rationale, at such time as the application comes to the Board of County Commissioners for their consideration:

- 1) The applicant has failed to submit the information that the DRC requested at its last meeting on this application. The DRC requested that information to enable the applicant to render the application to a bare minimum level of sufficiency to demonstrate (potential) compliance with applicable standards, and its forwarding to the Board of County Commissioners for their consideration. In itself, this should warrant the DRC's recommendation that the application be denied.
- 2) During the time period in which I served as Leon County's DRC's chair and represented the Department of Growth and Environmental Management, the Planning Department's delegate DRC member made a motion that the DRC act to deny any application that, because of incompleteness or the applicant's request, had to be continued for consideration at another meeting, more than a specific number of times; I believe that number being two times. The DRC voted to approve this motion and in so doing initiated a new protocol. Subsequently, the DRC has followed-through, and applied this protocol on the singular occasion when an application was deficient so many times as to invoke this standard (that application being known as the "Celestial Gardens" site and development plan application).
- 3) An Environmental Impact Analysis (EIA) for this application has not been approved by Leon County. This is a significant deficiency, as the application can not, therefore demonstrate that subsequent development would be in compliance with the County's environmentally-related land development regulations or even that the applicant understands all of the environmental-based implications of the proposed development. A completed approved EIA is a prerequisite for an application at this stage in the process; the applicant's failure to provide this document represents a compulsory reason to deny this application.
- 4) The application remains deficient with regard to satisfaction of school facility concurrency requirements. It is my understanding that the LCSB's review of the application revealed that it will result in a facility deficiency of approximately 150+ elementary school classroom seats. The application should not be approved unless and until this issue is satisfactorily resolved.

5) The application is deficient with regard to satisfaction of transportation facility concurrency requirements. It is my understanding that the County staff's review of the application revealed that it will result in system deficiencies requiring of approximately \$1 million of mitigation. To date, the applicant has not formally indicated their willingness to comply with these requirements by executing a completed mitigation agreement. The application should not be approved unless and until this issue is satisfactorily resolved.

6) The application proposes an unorthodox, fragmented, unsubstantiated, and insufficient approach to complying with applicable Conservation Subdivision regulations, as set out in the Leon County Land Development Code. The application proposes that most of the environmentally sensitive area on site that will be located in the designated reserve area, approximately 385 acres, will be transferred to and under the protection of the Florida Fish & Wildlife Commission (F&WC); that the designated Qualified Management Entity (QME) will be the Chason Woods Homeowners' Association, but that management will be implemented by Entrix, Inc. The application proposes that the balance of the reserve area, approximately 43 acres, will be transferred to and under the protection of the Leon County.

While these proposed arrangements represent a fragmented and unorthodox approach to applicable land management requirements, they are only an issue of form; the real problems with regard to complying with applicable regulations are that the application does not include an approved land management plan for the designated reserve area, nor does it provide any documentation from the F&WC or Leon agreeing to be a designated QME or even acknowledging this proposal.

The application warrants denial given the absence of an appropriately designated QME found to be sufficient by County staff, and supported with bona fide documentation, demonstrating the entity's acceptance of this responsibility and the fiscal wherewithal to implement incumbent maintenance commitments.

7) The applicant's utility (water and sewer) utility concept plan received conditional approval from the utility provider of record, the City of Tallahassee. One of the conditions requires the applicant to enter into and execute a Utility Letter of Agreement (with the City). Given the significant cost of extending utility infrastructure to this development, the application should not be approved unless and until the applicant has provided a surety instrument, found to be sufficient by the County Attorney, and as appropriate, the City of Tallahassee, that ensures that the costs of extending this infrastructure will not be bourn in whole or in part by the public of Leon County; and, that the applicant provide this surety prior to final approval of the site and development plan application, should it otherwise warrant approval. To date, no such surety has been provided.

8) The applicant has requested a deviation to the minimum lot size requirement for the development, a reduction from one-half (1/2) acre to one-quarter (1/4) acre. Precedent for granting such a substantial deviation does not exist. To the contrary, precedence is to significantly limit both the breadth and depth of deviations granted to minimum lot size dimension standards associated with Conservation Subdivisions.

This issue came to fore on the singular occasion of a request for a deviation to minimum lot size tendered by the applicant for Talquin Meadows. In response, Leon County, approved a deviation allowing lot size to be reduced, for only 5 lots, from a standard minimum of 0.8 acres to 0.5 acres; the deviation was deemed necessary due to the unusual limiting linear and narrow shape of the development site. The precedent set by the County's action in the Talquin Meadows application represented a 37.5% decrease in lot size for less than 10 lots. In contrast to this precedent, the applicant for this Chason Woods application proposes a 50% decrease in minimum lot size and seeks to apply this standard to the majority of lots proposed in the development.

The precedence of Talquin Meadows provided a deviation wherein the developer obtained a moderate degree of additional flexibility for a handful of lots. The deviation request accompanying the Chason Woods application is different: the applicant essentially seeks, through this application for deviation, to change the fundamental nature of the number and size of lots allowed in a conservation subdivision in the Urban Fringe (UF) Future Land Use Category and UF zoning district.

9) It is my professional opinion that the application is inconsistent with a number of Comprehensive Plan Objectives and Policies.

9 a) In offering this opinion, I begin by acknowledging that there is a singular provision in the Comprehensive Plan, Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element, that is supportive of the application and the application is presumably consistent with this policy. That said, I would not propose that the application is consistent with Objective 1.3. of that same sub-element, which the policy is intended to support (both the objective and policy are provided below):

Objective 1.3., Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element (Rev. Effective 8/17/92)

Needed sanitary sewer facilities will be provided in a manner which promotes orderly, compact urban and cost efficient growth while optimizing the use of existing facilities.

8) The applicant has requested a deviation to the minimum lot size requirement for the development, a reduction from one-half (1/2) acre to one-quarter (1/4) acre. Precedent for granting such a substantial deviation does not exist. To the contrary, precedence is to significantly limit both the breadth and depth of deviations granted to minimum lot size dimension standards associated with Conservation Subdivisions.

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Objective 1.3., Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element (Rev. Effective 8/17/92)

Needed sanitary sewer facilities will be provided in a manner which promotes orderly, compact urban and cost efficient growth while optimizing the use of existing facilities.

Policy 1.3.1: Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element (Rev. Effective 9/19/91; Rev. Effective 7/26/06)

Central sanitary sewer service shall be provided only in the Urban Service Area, except as provided below for the Urban Fringe land use category. Areas outside the urban service shall obtain sewage treatment through the use of an on-site system. An on-site system means any sanitary sewer system designed and built to serve a single parcel of land, i.e., septic tank or package treatment plant with capacity sized to:

- a) Meet the demand for a single parcel of land and its intended use.
- b) Meet the projected demand for a single parcel of land after its subdivision.

An on-site system may serve more than one parcel but only to correct an existing environmental problem. The capacity of these facilities shall be limited to that necessary to serve development existing on or prior to February 1, 1990.

For areas lying outside of the USA boundary and within the Urban Fringe land use category, central sanitary sewer service may be extended and/or provided by an existing utility provider under the following circumstances:

- a) To serve an existing residential subdivision in order to correct documented environmental or health problems associated with failing septic treatment systems; or
- b) To serve a new Conservation subdivision, Urban Fringe cluster subdivision or permitted non-residential use that is otherwise in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan and its implementing land development regulations; AND
- c) No additional lands designated Rural or Urban Fringe as of the effective date of this revised policy shall be converted to a more dense or intense land use category unless adjoining lands are also within the designated USA boundary.

All costs of sewer line extensions, any necessary lift stations and on-site sewer infrastructure shall be borne by the developer as specified within the adopted "Water and Sewer Agreement" and shall be constructed to the standards specified within the Agreement. In cases where the City of Tallahassee is the service provider, the City Manager and the County Administrator or their designees may agree that the connection of a development to central sewer is not economically feasible and may deny such requests to connect. Such cases may arise when considering lower density isolated developments, developments located in areas that are not environmentally sensitive, or developments that are not within a reasonable distance to existing infrastructure. The City of Tallahassee shall place a higher priority upon serving areas that are within the Southern Strategy Area and/or areas that may be determined to negatively impact the environmental quality of Wakulla Springs if developed with traditional septic tank systems. The City of Tallahassee reserves the right to develop agreements with property owners and developers to make service available within time frames and at locations that vary from those criteria for connection found within the "Water and Sewer Agreement". As part of such agreements, additional financial responsibility may be borne by the developer for connection to occur.

9 b) The Land Use Element provides a Goal, an Objective, and Policies in direct opposition to the exceptional provision of Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element. The most recently amended provisions of this portion of the Land Use Element were accomplished at the same time as the most recent amendment of Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element, and presumably intentionally contradict that policy, to prohibit, or at least, inhibit, the extension of central water and sewer utilities to areas designated Urban Fringe on the Future Land Use Map. If not intentional, they in fact do have that effect. I provide applicable information with citations, as follows:

Land Use Goal 1: (Effective 7/16/90)

The Comprehensive Plan shall protect and enhance the quality of life in this community by providing economically sound educational, employment, cultural, recreational, commercial, industrial and professional opportunities to its citizens while channeling inevitable growth into locations and activities that protect the natural and aesthetic environments and residential neighborhoods.

It is my contention that the proposed new development is neither "inevitable growth" nor is the proposed location one that can accommodate the development while sufficiently protecting the natural environment, and therefore, the application is inconsistent with this goal.

Land Use Objective 1.1: (Effective 7/16/90; Revision Effective 7/26/06)

Direct development to those areas which have in place, or have agreements to provide, the land and water resources, fiscal abilities, and the service capacity to accommodate growth in an environmentally acceptable manner. This shall be accomplished in part through the establishment and maintenance of an Urban Service Area (USA) concept. This Urban Service Area (USA) concept is based upon a desire to have Tallahassee and Leon County grow in a responsible manner, with infrastructure provided economically and efficiently, and surrounding forest and agricultural lands protected from unwarranted and premature conversion to urban land use. An urban service strategy provides for well-managed, orderly growth, which preserves natural resources and promotes fiscal responsibility. The location and size of the USA shall be depicted on the Future Land Use Map and is based upon the area necessary to accommodate 90% of new residential dwelling units within the County by 2020; the ability to provide urban infrastructure; and, the presence of environmentally sensitive lands and water bodies, requiring protection from the impacts of urban development.

The application does not provide documentation of agreements to provide sufficient central water and sewer services to accommodate the proposed development in an environmentally acceptable manner. The application does not demonstrate that the public will not ultimately be left to underwrite the sewer and central water infrastructure extension to the proposed development, education facility and transportation infrastructure improvements that will be necessary as a result of the development, or the management and protection of environmentally sensitive lands on site.

This objective states that one of the purposes of the urban service area is to prevent the unwarranted and premature conversion of forest lands to urban land; my contention is that the development proposed in this application is emblematic of such unwarranted and premature conversion. Because of these reasons, I contend that the application is inconsistent with this objective.

Land Use Policy 1.1.1 (Revision Effective 7/20/05)

In order to discourage urban sprawl, new development shall be concentrated in the urban service area plus in the Woodville Rural Community future land use category and the rural communities of Capitola, Chaires, Ft. Braden and Miccosukee, as designated on the future land use map.

This policy states that it is obligatory that new development be concentrated in the urban service area or in one of the listed rural communities; it does not provide for new development to be concentrated in the urban fringe, which, if the application were approved, would occur. This circumscription of areas into which new development shall be channelled is in opposition to and countervails the exceptional provisions of Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element. I contend that the application is inconsistent with this policy, by allowing development to concentrate where inappropriate locations.

Land Use Policy 1.1.3 (Rev. Effective 12/10/91; Revision Effective 7/26/06)

Capital infrastructure designed to support urban density outside the Urban Service Area shall be prohibited except as described below. Capital infrastructure which is designed or intended to provide services to the population of the Urban Service Area may be located outside the Urban Service Area. This policy includes but is not limited to landfill, spray irrigation facilities, and inter-county transportation roadways.

Capital improvement projects or expenditures designed to support urban density outside of the Urban Service Area will not occur outside the designated Urban Service Area unless a demonstrated hardship can be shown to occur for existing development or residents as of February 1, 1990. A demonstrated hardship refers to:

- Replacement of existing facilities due to deterioration or destruction from natural disaster.
- A public health and/or safety problem if no improvements are made (example - contaminated water wells).
- Potential of severe environmental degradation if no improvements are made (example - failing septic tanks).

The capacity of these facilities shall be limited to that necessary to serve development existing on or prior to February 1, 1990.

This policy is clear and explicit with regard to limitations on extending capital infrastructure to support urban densities outside of the urban services area. The application would allow urban densities in the development portion of the site, and in fact, would provide for some portions of the development to be developed at up to four (4) dwelling units per acre. This policy provides an absolute bar against extending such infrastructure to such locations, except to remedy a very limited set of hardships experienced by residents since 1990 and applicable to a development in existence at that time. This application is clearly inconsistent with this policy. Like Policy 1.1.1 of the Land Use Element, this policy is in direct opposition to and countervails the exceptional provisions of Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element.

Should there be any confusion as to what Land Use Policy 1.3.1 intends by the use of the term "capital infrastructure," Policy 1.1.5 provides the following clarity:

Land Use Policy 1.1.5 (Effective 7/16/90; Revision Effective 7/26/06)

Future Land Use Map densities and intensities are intended to reflect the availability of capital infrastructure. Capital infrastructure, which supports higher land use densities and intensities, consists of sewer and water, roads, mass transit, solid waste, drainage, and parks.

This policy clarifies that sewer and water are considered capital infrastructure, thereby defining what is meant in Land Use Policy 1.1.3 in regard to not extending capital infrastructure to serve urban density outside the urban service area.

Should there be any confusion as to what Land Use Policy 1.3.1 intends by the use of the term "urban density," Policy 1.1.9 provides the following clarity:

Land Use Policy 1.1.9 (Effective 7/26/06)

In order to achieve efficient and effective use of infrastructure and land, residential density within the USA shall average no less than 2 dwelling units per gross acre. Some future land use categories may establish higher minimum densities and minimum intensity requirements for nonresidential development. Attainment of minimum densities and intensities will be measured and reported annually and be evaluated at a minimum during subsequent Evaluation and Appraisal Reports and adjustments to the Comprehensive Plan necessary to achieve this measure will be recommended as warranted in the future.

This policy clarifies that residential densities within the urban service area shall average no less than two dwelling units per acre, and therefore, this minimum should be considered integral to the definition of "urban density."

Land Use Policy 1.1.4 (Revision Effective 7/20/05)

Central water and sewer may be provided in areas designated as Rural Community, Woodville Rural Community, and enclaves within the Woodville Rural Community designated for Residential Preservation on the future land use map.

This policy does not provide for extension of either central water or sewer to areas designated Urban Fringe on the future land use map. It is my contention that extension of these utilities to the Urban Fringe is inconsistent with this policy.

Land Use Policy 1.1.8 (Effective 7/26/06)

The size of the USA is related to the projected fiscal capacity of the local government to provide urban infrastructure. An assessment of changing conditions over the 20-year period of the plan is built in through the required seven year Evaluation and Appraisal Report (EAR) and the annual capital improvements process. The integrity of the USA concept is maintained by strict adherence to the premise of not funding or scheduling major capital improvement projects outside the USA, Rural Communities or the Woodville Rural Community in conjunction with a policy of discouraging premature use and underutilization of land designated for urban development. Additionally, the size of the USA should be limited to reflect the ability of the public to provide infrastructure, limitations of environmental constraints and existing development and to provide for a phasing mechanism to the year 2020.

The area within the USA is sized to accommodate approximately 50% more vacant land than is necessary to accommodate the population growth expected within the USA from 1993 to 2020. It is expected that a USA sized 50% larger than our vacant land needs will provide sufficient constraint for growth management policies to be effective, while not over constraining the supply of vacant land.

This policy is explicit that the integrity of the USA concept is maintained by strict adherence to the premise of not funding or scheduling major capital improvement projects outside the USA, Rural Communities or the Woodville Rural Community. The proposed development would engender the requirement of subsequent major capital improvements outside of the USA, within the Urban Fringe, and would thereby contribute to the disintegration of the urban service area concept, and accordingly is inconsistent with this Policy.

9 c) I close my comments on the issue of Comprehensive Plan consistency to re-emphasize that the apparent internal inconsistency in the Comprehensive Plan, between the exceptional provision of Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element, and the provisions set out in Goal 1 of the Land Use Element, Objective 1.1.1, and subsequent implementing policies, should not be construed as to somehow elevate the singular exception above the Land Use Element provisions, which are more extensive in scope and more extensive in terms of absolute prohibitions. Perhaps of equal importance, that the Goal, Objective and four of the implementing Land Use Element policies were contemplated at the same time and adopted at the same time as Policy 1.3.1 of the Sanitary Sewer Sub-Element, should be evidence that the policy directions embodied in the Land Use Element can not be considered a mere oversight.

10) The application proposes a development of over 480 houses located a significant driving distance from employment centers, shopping opportunities, schools, and other public facilities. It will be approximately 2.5 miles from the center of the Woodville community, 10 miles from State of Florida Capital Circle Office Complex (CCOC) in Tallahassee, and 12 miles to Crawfordville, Fl. Consequently, the associated generation of vehicle miles traveled for this development will likely be significantly greater than were it a comparable sized development within the urban services area.

In comparison, the proposed Southside DRI will have approximately 3,000 dwelling units with much shorter trips to employment centers (2.25 miles to the CCOC and 5 miles to downtown Tallahassee), will contain a significant number of shopping opportunities and facilities within or close by, and will have access to transit; therefore, it is possible that although the Southside DRI will have approximately 6 times the number of residents, the associated aggregate VMT will be within the same level of magnitude as that of Chason Woods. Therefore, it would appear that Chason Woods would contribute a significant volume of air pollution, including greenhouse gasses, when compared to similar and larger sized developments located within the urban services area.

The removal of a large quantity of vegetation to accommodate the homesites, streets, and other attendant infrastructure necessary for this development will exacerbate this problem, as the vegetation functions to sequester carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. These anticipated air quality impacts raise issues of compliance with the following two sections of regulations set out in the Land Development Code:

Section 10-4.104, Objectives (related to Environmental Management) – Subsection (1) part b., to wit:

This article is intended to protect, maintain, and enhance both the immediate and long-term health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the county. The following objectives support this purpose by encouraging productive and enjoyable harmony between humanity and nature. The objectives are listed according to their primary purpose, but many objectives also relate to and support other purposes of the article.

(1) Overall

To protect natural systems and avoid impairment of their beneficial function.

Section 10-7.104, Purposes (of subdivision and site and development plan regulations), subsections (1), (6), and (7), to wit:

The purposes of this article are to:

- (1) Protect and provide for the public health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of the county.*
- (6) Provide for coordination between review of development and subdivision proposals with Articles III and IV and other applicable county requirements.*
- (7) Provide for adequate light, air, and privacy, to secure safety from fire, flood, and other danger, and to prevent overcrowding of the land and undue congestion of population.*

And, **Section 10-7.505**, General Principles of Design Relating to Impacts on Nearby Streets and Property Owners, subsection (2), to wit:

(2) Minimize adverse environmental impacts both on-site and off-site;

11) The application represents the extension of central sanitary sewer and central potable water infrastructure several miles beyond their current termini, to a remote location outside of the urban services area, while other portions of the urban services area are not presently served by such infrastructure and can not sustain urban-intensity development. This extension of infrastructure will produce a classic pattern of leap-frog, sprawl development. Accordingly, this development application would appear not to comply with the following four (4) regulations relating to the orderly, efficient, progression of growth and extension of infrastructure:

Section 10-6.613, Urban Fringe zoning district (excerpt), to wit:

The UF zoning district is intended to provide for low-intensity development that can be accommodated without a full complement of urban services and infrastructure.

Section 10-7.104, Purposes (of subdivision and site and development plan regulations), subsections (8), (10), to wit:

The purposes of this article are to:

- (8) Encourage the orderly and beneficial development of all unincorporated parts of the county.*
- (10) Guide public policy and private action in order to provide adequate and efficient transportation, water, sewerage, schools, parks, playgrounds, recreation and other public facilities and services.*

Section 10-7.501, Substantive Standards and Criteria, Generally, subsection (e) part (1), to wit:

(e) No development shall be approved unless it has been designed so as to reasonably achieve the following:

- (1) The adequate and efficient supply of utilities and services to new land developments.*

And, **Section 10-7.524**, Public Sanitary Sewer or On-site Sewage Disposal Systems., subsection (b), to wit:

(b) Needed sanitary sewer facilities will be provided in a manner which promotes orderly, compact urban and cost efficient growth while optimizing the use of existing facilities.

I submit these comments for you and the DRC and other associated staff to consider; I do not require a reply nor is it necessary on my account for any DRC report to respond. Of course, I do request that these comments be considered and maintained in the record file and, if you are attaching public comment to the DGEM report, that these comments be included. Should you require any additional clarification on any of the content included herein, please feel free to contact me.

On behalf of the Wakulla Watershed Coalition (WWC), please include these comments regarding the Chason Woods Conservation Subdivision in the file for the Development Review Committee (DRC) meeting April 7, 2010. The WWC is strongly opposed to the development as proposed and urges the DRC to recommend a strong denial of this project. We submitted more substantive comments regarding this specific proposal back in October 2009 and those issues still stand as relevant and are enclosed.

As of this writing, no additional information or response has come from the applicant to our knowledge prior to the deadline for this meeting and since the last time the DRC met on this issue. It would be highly inappropriate to accept additional information from the applicant, were it to be submitted, for the April 7, 2010 meeting since there would be no time for staff or public review or comment. Therefore, the WWC feels strongly that this item should be brought up to a vote at the April 7 DRC meeting and sent to the Leon County Board of County Commissioners with a strong recommendation for denial and set for the earliest date possible for this consideration.


Also of concern is the apparent lack of interest on behalf of the applicant to address the numerous deficiencies, including environmental concerns, which have been pointed out throughout the planning process and by members of the public. As you are surely aware, this property is also subject to potential state acquisition as a *Florida Forever* project. At the same time the applicant is apparently attempting to develop the property they are also seemingly using the imminent threat of development to provide urgency for state acquisition.

The WWC believes the property subject to the Chason Woods development would best be served as an addition to lands owned and managed by the State of Florida. Enclosed are signatures from 815 individuals from all over the world, but mostly from Tallahassee

and the surrounding area, who visit and love Wakulla Springs and want to see this gem protected. Please take these individuals' comments into your consideration.

With all the issues that have been raised but not addressed with the Chason Woods development over the past many months, there can be no justifiable reason for the DRC to recommend anything but denial for this project. This project has been delayed numerous times already, with the lack of regard of staff time and public input. Now is the time to recommend denying this proposal and ending this development project.

Dear Mr. Culpepper:

As President of the Wakulla Watershed Coalition (WWC), I am writing to submit commits regarding the Chason Woods Conservation Subdivision for the October 14, 2009 technical review meeting. The WWC is an organization comprised of individuals and persons involved with other area organizations and that works to protect water quality and quantity in Wakulla County through education and advocacy. Last year, we spearheaded the expansion of the Wakulla Springs Special Planning Area based on the recent scientific data (a.k.a., "Wakulla Spring Protection Zone") while working with Wakulla County staff and Commissioners. We also supported Leon County's efforts to adopt the Primary Spring Protection Zone (PSPZ) earlier this year.¹

We have a number of concerns regarding Chason Woods Conservation Subdivision project that can be categorized as:

1. Project within Wakulla Spring contribution zone,
2. Development of Regional Impact
3. High density, Incompatibility with surrounding land
4. Conservation Area
5. Urbanization of watershed

Project within Spring Protection Zone

The project site for this proposed development lies within four miles of Wakulla Springs and sits atop and completely within the watershed. This property is up to 70% in environmentally sensitive lands, such as wetlands, karst features, and is indirectly and may be directly connected to the groundwater aquifer. As you may know, this specific

parcel is on the State Land Acquisition List² which supports the sensitive nature of this property. The Wakulla County Board of County Commissioners has recently adopted a policy supporting state acquisition of this land.³ Keeping this land in its natural state would be the best use of this parcel.

Earlier this year, Leon County adopted the PSPZ as a way to provide awareness and some limited developmental policies in the area of the county that is most vulnerable to contaminating the groundwater and aquifer. Likewise, the property is immediately adjacent to the recently expanded "Wakulla Springs Protection Zone." These two spring protection zones are areas that are known to be within the contribution zone for Wakulla Spring: a major economic engine in the region. These zones were created and expanded based on recent science. The Leon County Aquifer Vulnerability Assessment (LAVA) was recently completed which significantly contributed to the PSPZ. The LAVA assessment shows that this parcel is wholly contained within the two most vulnerable categories. The proposed development does not go far enough to protect this very sensitive natural resource and groundwater which largely serves as our region's drinking water. In fact, as proposed, the development goes beyond what should be allowed and seeks to further intensify the land use by seeking the maximum number of residential units that could be possible. This is not acceptable.

Development of Regional Impact

According to the pre-Application material and subsequent department documentation, the applicant has committed to "workforce affordable housing" and is seeking a deviation from land development standards. Together, these two components of their plan seek to nearly double the number of units allowed on the property while being exempt from state review through the Development of Regional Impact process. While the notion and commitment of affordable housing is noble, this maneuver can be viewed as a less noble scheme to avoid a state comprehensive review of the potential impacts of this project. This project should be voluntarily submitted to the Department of Community Affairs seeking a DRI review. If the applicant is committed to both affordable housing and protecting Wakulla Springs, then a DRI review may serve to accommodate both. As we all know, putting urban-style development on or near extremely sensitive land with probable connections to the aquifer, even with sewer, will impact Wakulla Springs and the aquifer. So by definition, this becomes a development of regional impact and should be treated as such.

Too High Density, Incompatibility

According to the application documentation, the applicant is seeking a deviation from the developmental standard for a Conservation Subdivision of minimum lot size from 0.50 to 0.25 acres in order to be able to gain approval for the maximum number of densities allowed within this category. This deviation should not be recommended for approval and should be outright rejected. This type of high density is incompatible with

the surrounding land use and zoning. The applicant is not simply entitled to the maximum units in all cases even if it requires changing the standards and if there is the promise or even an identified mechanism of paying for the extension of sewer to this site. Even without this deviation, the project could contain some 300-400 residential units, far too many given the nature of the land. As it stands now, the Conservation Subdivision category as allowed within the PSPZ, the developmental standards are not nearly restrictive enough.

The allowable density for this project under the Urban Fringe (UF) zoning and land use and as a "conservation subdivision" is 1.33 dwelling units per acre with a minimum lot size of 0.50 acres. Within the PSPZ, in areas designated as UF, the permitted density is 1 dwelling unit per 3 acres where sewer is not available, which is the approximate density of much of the surrounding area. This would equate to approximately 232 dwelling units on performance-based septic systems. Even at this density, this would allow far too many houses and pollution on such a small space that is proposed as developable. However, as a Conservation Subdivision with sewer available, allowable densities would enable 523 residential units on 273 acres which is just slightly over the minimum lot size allowed (0.50 acres). It is inconceivable how 4 units per acre for 273 acres would even be compatible with the intent and goals of the PSPZ and the concept of a Conservation Subdivision.

Given the constraints of the parcel and the environmentally sensitive features contained on site, the Planning Department and the County should be working with the developer to get the residential impact and the overall footprint of the project as low as possible, not attempting to squeeze out as many units as possible and legally allowed. Clearly, the applicant has demonstrated much more concern with maximizing residential units to increase developmental potential over protecting the health of Wakulla Springs.

Conservation Area Based on Environmental Sensitivity of the Land

As part of the Conservation Subdivision development category, at least half of the parcels are required to be put into a conservation easement and only used for passive uses. According to the application, approximately 62% of the land is to be put into conservation. However, the applicant has mentioned in public meetings that they might drop that down to 50% if they do not receive the deviation of the allowable minimum lot size from 0.50 to 0.25 acres. The amount of land that is put into the conservation easement should not be dictated on how many houses the applicant desires, but should be primarily based on the sensitive nature of the land and location of this sensitive land on site. For instance, if wetlands and karstic features are scattered throughout the property, this should severely constrain the types and locations of land uses allowed. The intensity use of this land (*i.e.*, how many units are allowed) should not be based on the applicant's bottom line, but how many units and its accompanying infrastructure can safely be put on this property given the constraints of the environmental sensitivities of this land. Additionally, requiring projects within the PSPZ to implement Low-Impact Development standards is a good policy but should not be used as a way to

justify higher density or projects that intensify the land use as such that will jeopardize the watershed and springs.

Urbanization of the Springshed

The applicant is proposing to extend sewer lines up to six miles through Woodville, which is the preferred method for sewage treatment in this area. However, it is unclear and highly questionable that the T. P. Smith Wastewater Treatment Plant could even handle an increase in sewage treatment from this development and the affected Woodville Rural Community. It can be presumed to a high degree of confidence that if a sewer line is extended through Woodville, this would likely spur future intensified growth in that region of the county. The County and Planning Department should consider impacts and effects not just from the proposed development, but on also on potential subsequent urbanization of the region four miles directly north of Wakulla Spring. It is poor planning to run a sewer line six miles to put nearly 2,000 new residents crammed in 4 houses per acre on top of a groundwater recharge area. Enabling maximum density in order to pay for extending sewer lines some six miles through low-density, rural residential areas is in effect sprawl.

Conclusion

In conclusion, we urge the technical review panel to carefully examine the potential impacts from this project to regional groundwater and natural resources and look for ways to decrease this impact through minimizing residential development and increasing conservation areas. We look forward to working with the staff and the County to accomplish these goals. Feel free to contact me to address any concerns raised in this letter.

I scamper into the backseat of my godmother's 1985 Plymouth Horizon and impatiently wait to get going. "Come on. It's hot. Let's go," I whine. Deb climbs in, starts the engine, and we are off. The road is not long (only about 12 miles), but in my young mind, it is forever. The fabric of the backseat peels from ages of sunning, and with no air conditioning, the open windows are my only comfort. So, I stick my curly head out, feeling the breeze with its faint turpentine scent and taking in the scenery.</p> <p>A few hundred feet before the entrance, I spot the sign: Wakulla Springs State Park. A 30-foot blue billboard, with a smiling fish vaulting out of the water, stands strikingly in the middle of the National Forest. Deb drives up to the booth and pays the entrance fee. "Alrighty ma'am," the ranger says, "have a good one and you, too, Scout." Continuing past, we find a place to park and get out. Toting our towels, we mosey down the cobbled walkway. Stopping at a local vendor's makeshift stand, we buy a quart of boiled peanuts. The cashier fills a plastic bag to the rim, settling it inside a paper sack as if we were buying whiskey. The salty brine drips down my arm, forming little rivulets of juice that I lick up. Popping one after another open in my mouth, I walk down to the water, leaving a Hansel and Gretel trail of peanut shells.</p> <p>The spring is a sight that opens before me with bald Cypresses casting shadows over the emerald green water. A deep chasm opens its mouth out of the earth and spills forth 250 million gallons of water a day. It is the largest freshwater spring in the world. On a bank of the opening, visitors to the park wade and swim. I wander over to the edge to play in the shallows: chasing minnows, building sandcastles, and playing gator. I feel the chill of the water as it climbs up my legs. It is freezing! It shimmers there, clear as Miami Beach and clean as bottled water. Despite this, the spring provides for an abundance of life. From the shoreline, I can see a menagerie of turtles of all sizes lounging on logs and alligators from eight inches to eight feet resting in the seaweed. Ospreys cry out from the skies as they dart about. Anhingas swim through the watery glass or perch on branches, drying their wings in the sun. I spot mullet leap out of the water and throw themselves back in to break the glass into shimmering droplets that</p> <p><i>(continues on next page)</i></p>

Due to water having no place to go, the runoff drained pure farming residue directly into the Mississippi all the bottomland areas became slack water dead zones. It has taken several years and millions of dollars to restore the back water pools for the millions of fish and birds that utilize these areas and water. Much effort is needed to keep development subdivisions off the bluffs and conserve the Karst bluff land areas along the Mississippi River. The Tundra Swans have just recently returned to Pools 5, 7, 8 of the Mississippi, after substantial pool draw downs and back water island restoration by the USFWS and the Army Corp of Engineers. Keep your Karst formations because they are the natural ground water filters.
