Leon County Citizens Connect App



Leon County Sandbags



This free event will be on **September 23** at the Donald L. Tucker Civic Center. It is open to all members of our community who want to learn more about the local history of race relations and identify the origins and



In every newsletter, local historian and long-time District 3 resident **Mary May** treats us to an interesting anecdote from Leon County History.


