Hello,

I hope you and your family are doing well. Contained in this issue of our enewsletter are the County's services schedule for the Fourth of July holiday, updated information about our COVID-19 response, the Welaunee Comp Plan amendments, and several other items we hope you'll find useful. In addition, I wanted to highlight two important issues:

1) Leon County's mask mandate - As you may know, last week the County Commission held a special meeting and unanimously approved a countywide mask mandate. Not everyone agrees with this emergency ordinance, but I am confident we made the right decision based on the local/state data and the feedback from health experts. For us, it was a choice between two undesirable options: 1) issuing a mask mandate in the hopes of mitigating the current and future spread, which in turn will likely increase the chance of the K-12 schools, FSU, FAMU and TCC opening in the fall, or 2) continuing with the status quo. If the schools don't open, our local economy — already reeling — will be further damaged.

These are very challenging times, and we're doing our best to make sound decisions based on science, data, and advice from experts. We've included details about the mask ordinance below, but if you have any comments, questions, or suggestions, please don't hesitate to contact me at MinorR@leoncountyfl.gov. Thank you for everything you're doing to keep yourself, your loved ones, and others safe.

2) Leon County Commission moving to once-a-month meetings? - At the County Commission's June 16th meeting, a majority of Commissioners voted to change our twice-a-month meeting schedule to once-a-month. I strongly disagreed with the motion, said so during the meeting, and voted against it. In my opinion, the reduced meeting frequency undermines the public's access to their Commissioners, and it hinders the public's ability to provide feedback. I respect my colleagues on the County Commission and I know they care about their constituents, but I strongly believe this decision was a mistake.

Unfortunately, this decision received little if any news coverage. If this issue is important to you, please click <u>HERE</u> to email the County Commission and share your thoughts. I want to rescind this policy and return to the original, 2-meeting-a-month frequency, but first we'll need to hear from you and others.

This Fourth of July weekend will be subdued for many of us -- my family plans to stay home, let our girls wave some sparklers, and then watch fireworks on TV. If you do venture out, please maintain physical distance from others and wear a mask.

To Protect Public Health, County Requires Face Coverings



To mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and protect the public health of our community, our Commissionlast week approved an emergency ordinance requiring face coverings. As confirmed cases of COVID-19 continue to rise locally and statewide, the ordinance states that, in Leon County, individuals must wear face coverings while in business establishments.

A "business establishment" means a location with a roof overhead under which any business is conducted, goods are made/stored/processed or where services are rendered. It also includes locations where non-profit, governmental, churches and quasi-governmental entities facilitate public interactions and conduct business. Also, as part of the requirement, all businesses must post a notice visible to all customers that face coverings are required while indoors. An example of a sign for businesses can be found HERE.

Facial coverings are not required to be worn by the following persons:

- Persons under the age of six years;
- Persons who have trouble breathing due to a chronic pre-existing condition or individuals with a
 documented or demonstrable medical problem. It is the intent of this provision that those
 individuals who cannot tolerate a facial covering for a medical, sensory, or any other condition
 which makes it difficult for them to utilize a facial covering and function in public are not required
 to wear one;
- Persons in their private rooms of a lodging establishment, such as a hotel, motel, or vacation rental—however, face coverings must be worn in all indoor commons areas of said establishment;
- Persons exercising while observing at least six feet of distancing from another person;
- Restaurant and bar patrons eating or drinking;
- Business owners, managers, and employees who are in an area of a business establishment that
 is not open to customers, patrons, or the public, provided that six feet of distance exists between
 persons.

The ordinance will remain in place until repealed. A copy of the ordinance and frequently asked questions will be posted to the Leon County Emergency Information Portal at www.LeonCountyFL.gov/ei.

The ordinance does not require persons to wear face coverings while outdoors. However, the County continues to strongly encourage residents to wear face coverings when unable to maintain a physical distance from others.

Distribution of Free Cloth Face Coverings at County Libraries



Leon County is making thousands of free face coverings available for pickup at all County library locations listed below, during regular hours. Individuals may request one covering and may also pick up one for each immediate family member.

All County branch libraries are open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday. The County main library is open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday, and 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Sunday. These additional masks complement the County's ongoing efforts to distribute cloth face masks at faith-based organizations in southern Leon County, at the FAMU-Bond COVID-19 testing site at Bragg Memorial Stadium and at FDOH's mobile testing sites throughout the community.



Our <u>Leon County Supervisor of Elections</u> encourages EVERY voter to request a vote-by-mail ballot for the 2020 elections!

Because we are unsure of how long the coronavirus will linger, voting by mail can protect our community's health and safety. You can request vote-by-mail ballots for the August 18th Primary and November 3rd General elections by going online at www.LeonVotes.org. It takes only a couple of minutes!

If you request a Vote-by-Mail ballot, you can still decide to vote in person at an early voting site or at your Election Day polling place, so long as you haven't already voted and can bring the ballot that was mailed to you.

The Welaunee Arch is an area of land located between Miccosukee Road and Robert Road and between Centerville Road and Crump Road. This privately owned property is the subject of a <u>proposed Comprehensive Plan amendment</u>. The proposed Master Plan for the Welanuee Arch generally outlines how the property will be developed over time, how urban services will be provided to the property, and what services and amenities will be provided to the public. The Master Plan is the first step in the development process and provides the broad parameters for how the property may be developed. Before development occurs, the Master Plan will be followed with one or more detailed Planned Unit Developments (PUDs). The PUDs would then be followed by even more detailed site plans.

At the May 26th Transmittal Hearing for the proposed Comprehensive Plan amendment, the Board of County Commissioners and the City Commission voted to submit the proposed amendment to the State for review and directed staff to hold virtual charrettes and at least one in-person charrettes (if possible according to CDC and WHO guidelines). A "charrette" is an intensive, multi-disciplinary workshop with the aim of developing a design or vision for a project or planning activity.

There are currently two ways to participate in the Welanuee Arch virtual charrettes. The first part is a series of live video conferences and the second part is a virtual workshop. You can register for both of these and learn more <u>HERE</u>.

Covid-19 Scam Targeting Seniors

Unfortunately, another scam targeting seniors has prompted the Florida's Attorney General to issue

an alert.

The Attorney General's Office is receiving reports from seniors offered thousands of dollars in federal grant money to stay isolated at home to prevent the spread of COVID-19.




Scammers are contacting seniors via Facebook Messenger, email and text messages to offer these sham grants, and to request upfront payment as insurance for the expedited delivery of grant money. The scheme involved a mock website, since shut down, purporting to be hosted by the U.S. Department of Treasury. The site also included videos of seniors endorsing the sham grant program.

As part of its active and ongoing investigation, Attorney General Moody's Office has worked with law enforcement partners to have the fraudulent website removed. However, there are concerns that scammers will simply move the site to a new online location, so please beware of this scam and use caution *anytime* you are asked to submit personal information. Stay Connected During a Disaster with Leon County Citizens Connect


Download the Leon County Citizens Connect App, your best source of emergency news and alerts. The most critical information will be delivered by push notifications directly to your phone or tablet.

Available for <u>iPhone</u> and <u>Android</u> devices, Leon County's Citizens Connect App will put up-to-the-minute emergency information at your fingertips, such as weather alerts, road closings, sandbag locations, and so much more.

The Leon County Citizens Connect App provides a single source of emergency information verified by public safety agencies, emergency management professionals, and other crews in the field. Through the mobile application, citizens can also access Leon County's Facebook page, Twitter account, and other important resources.

If you are unable to use your smartphone, tablet, or computer, timely and critical updates will be provided by emergency management officials on 88.9 WFSU-FM radio. By partnering with WFSU, Leon County and the City of Tallahassee will help ensure that any citizen with radio access stays informed before, during, and after a disaster. It's Kitten Season!

The warmer months are often met with an influx of kittens in shelters and rescue groups. If you can, consider fostering or donating supplies to help. If you find stray kittens, it's important to follow the steps below:



Kittens are much better left with their moms until at least 8 weeks old.

The shelter is **NO PLACE** for kittens unless it is absolutely necessary. They are very susceptible to getting sick when introduced to small spaces that house other cats as well.



1. OBSERVE

- · Count the number of kittens, if possible.
- · Do Not handle the kittens.
- Leave the kittens where you found them, mom is probably close.
 (unless they are in an unsafe high traffic area, you may move them close by, but very carefully).
- Watch from afar for mom making her visits.
- Put food and water out for mom but away from the kittens and remove it at night.
- If the kittens disappear mom has moved them, or is in the process of moving them, don't panic! This is completely normal.



- If mom does not return, kittens will need to be bottle fed.
 Bottle feeding foster parents are not always available but we can train you and provide you with the proper supplies.
- If mom and/or kittens are showing signs of being sick, injured, or threatened in some way, ask for help!
- If mom and kittens are thriving and are now old enough (8 weeks) to need further care such as vaccines, spay or neutering, and or adoption, resources are available to assist you.
