Lake Jackson and the Comp Plan



Growth, when done in a smart and responsible way, is good for a community. It creates more housing and more jobs, it increases incomes, and it strengthens the local economy. That being said, development should be done wisely. That's why we have Comprehensive Plans, because they provide a framework for where and how a community should grow.

Recent news stories have covered the initial Comp Plan draft, which proposed large scale development north of the Lake Jackson Aquatic Preserve (LJAP). Experts, residents, and I have expressed concern that these changes, if they had been adopted, could have threatened the LJAP as well as the canopy road on Meridian.

Summary:

- On Nov. 18th, the Leon County Commission rescinded the initial proposal -for land west of Meridian Road -- to expand the Urban Services Area and
 change more than 2,000 acres of Rural land to Lake Protection. I supported this
 part of the agenda item.
- However, at the same meeting, the Commission voted to proceed with adding nearly 1,500 acres to the Urban Services Area east of Meridian Road and north of Bannerman Road. (See the map below.) There are environmental benefits to doing this and I'm not necessarily opposed to it, but I have concerns about how this change might increase traffic on Meridian Road, which is already heavily congested.
- At the meeting I introduced a new policy change which, in the future, will require major Comp Plan changes to be explicitly presented to the public and the County Commission. The Commission approved this for inclusion in the next Comp Plan amendment cycle.
- Next steps: On Dec. 9th the County Commission will vote on whether to formally adopt the latest version of the Comp Plan.

The Details:

In March/April, the initial Comp Plan proposal included two major changes to the land north of Carr Lake and Lake Jackson: 1) expanding the Urban Services Area (USA) and 2) changing 2,082 acres of rural land to the Lake Protection land use category. By some estimates, these changes could have allowed around 20,000 housing units and millions of square feet of commercial space. However, the attorney working on behalf of the property owner recently said that even 5,000 housing units in that area might be unrealistic.

So that means that the Comp Plan proposal would have allowed at least FOUR TIMES more than what the landowner was even hoping for.

The USA expansion and the Lake Protection land use change weren't presented to the

County Commission during our February workshop or at our May 13th public hearing. And it wasn't brought up in my briefings until I asked our Planning Department about it.

If these changes had been adopted by the County Commission, we would have voted to allow tens of thousands of new housing units, and millions of square feet of commercial space — without even knowing about it!

Fortunately, that didn't happen. We caught it. Shortly after we transmitted the draft to the State for review, conservation groups reached out to me and I began speaking with staff to understand the magnitude of this change.

By then, the word had gotten out. Feedback from neighbors at public engagement meetings was universally opposed. Land conservation groups, Lake Jackson experts, and two letters from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection also expressed concern. This feedback, along with the Planning Department's review of the proposal's potential impact on water quality and Meridian Road traffic, persuaded them to rescind the initial proposal for the land west of Meridian Road.

As I've said many times, our Planning Department is very talented and they care about the community, but it shouldn't have happened this way.

Major, site-specific changes to the Comp Plan shouldn't be proposed without the public or the County Commission knowing about them. At the very least, the Planning Department should have highlighted this in its briefings to Commissioners, and explicitly presented it as a major change to the public. The *best* approach would have been to have had a separate Comp Plan amendment request.

What happened here should never happen again. To address this, I worked with our staff to draft a new Comp Plan policy that, once adopted, will ensure that major changes in the future will require a distinct, separate agenda item and/or presentation to the County Commission. This new policy was approved by the Commission for consideration during the next Comp Plan amendment cycle.

At the same meeting, the Commission voted to proceed with adding 1,485 acres to the Urban Services Area east of Meridian Road and north of Bannerman Road. (See the map below.) Public infrastructure (water, sewer) would be committed to these properties, which will be beneficial to Lake lamonia and, to a small extent, the Lake Jackson Aquatic Preserve. In addition, the maximum housing density of 1 housing unit per 3 acres will remain the same. I'm not necessarily opposed to this, but I have concerns about how this change might increase traffic on Meridian Road, which is already heavily congested.

I introduced a motion that accepted the new version of the Comp Plan but added four additions. (*Click here to review the actual document.*)

- 1. Including the new Comp Plan policy to require that 10+ acre changes or USA expansions be presented as a separate agenda item or in a workshop.
- 2. Removing the 1,485 acres of USA expansion east of Meridian Road and encouraging the property owner to go through the Comp Plan amendment process, so the public will have ample time to review it.
- 3. Request staff to evaluate the impacts of doubling Lake Protection Conservation Subdivision housing allowances from 2 units/acre to 4 units/acre.
- 4. Request staff to provide information on the estimated housing need and the amount of USA expansion necessary to accommodate that need.

After significant discussion, my colleagues accepted #1 but not #2 - #4. I'll work with staff over the coming weeks to obtain more information on these other points.

Next steps: On Dec. 9th the County Commission will vote on whether to formally adopt the latest version of the Comp Plan.


I want to thank the neighbors, the conservation groups, and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for being so engaged on the Lake Jackson issue. Their involvement and expertise made all the difference.

The landowner has the right to apply for a Comp Plan amendment in the future, and if he

does we'll give it the consideration it deserves, just as we would for any other request. Based on feedback from the public and conservation experts, it's imperative that any future plans continue to protect the Lake Jackson Aquatic Preserve and the canopy road at Meridian.

I hope you don't mind this lengthy report, but I believe our community's work on the Comp Plan is one of our greatest, most impactful responsibilities. During the meeting, one of my colleagues complained that this was a "nitpicky" discussion, but I respectfully disagree with him. We can't be lackadaisical about the Comp Plan — we need to encourage growth where it makes sense, consider our transportation capacities, and protect our water and green spaces. The Comp Plan rewrite, once adopted, will govern our growth for the next 25 years, so the Commission should take it very seriously. Details matter.

Update on Buc-ees



The Buc-ee's project is still in the early stages but proceeding without any major issues. Parcel acquisition is nearly complete, and the anticipated date for the groundbreaking is Q1 2026.

Park Update: Lake Jackson View Landing
