I hope you're doing well and are completing preparations for Tropical Storm Debby. Normally I send out newsletters like this during the work week, but with tropical storm force winds scheduled to arrive later today/tonight, we wanted to make sure you had the latest preparation information.

And of course, as past storms like Hurricane Michael have proven, this storm's path and/or intensity can change quickly, so please take the next few hours to complete any last minute to-do's.

Below is information provided by our <u>Leon County</u> <u>Emergency Management team</u>, which is among the best in the nation. While our staff have had far too much real-world practice over the years, the silver lining is that they're experienced and highly skilled in preparing for and responding to these storms. We're fortunate to have them serving our community.

Also included below are other, non-storm-related updates and events. Though not as urgent as our storm preparation info, but we still hope you'll find them helpful.

And finally -- we're awaiting the results of the USDOT <u>Safe</u> <u>Streets for All</u> grant application that the <u>CRTPA</u> submitted for North Monroe. If successful, we'll receive \$17M in federal funding for safety improvements on the North Monroe corridor. We might hear as soon as October, so keep your fingers crossed!

Thank you once again for the incredible honor of representing you at the Leon County Commission, and please don't hesitate to contact us if you have any suggestions, comments, questions or any community issues.

Update on Tropical Storm Debby



Leon County continues to closely monitor and prepare for Tropical Storm Debby. Important updates are below. Please prepare now. If you have any questions about how best to prepare, please call the Leon County Citizens Information Line at 850-606-3700.

In close coordination with the National Weather Service, Leon County wants every County citizen to know the latest, most accurate weather forecast as the storm continues to develop and strengthen. See below for an overview:

- The storm is expected to make landfall in Florida's Big Bend region by late tonight or early Monday.
- The storm will bring flooding, heavy rainfall, gusty winds, and coastal flooding across the Florida Peninsula this weekend, with the potential for prolonged impacts if it slows down near the Southeast coast.
- Specifically for Leon County, the forecast calls for up to six inches of rain, tropical-storm-force gusts, and flooding in some areas.
- Leon County has been upgraded to a Tropical Storm Warning and is currently under a Flood Watch from the National Weather Service. If the track continues to shift westward, Leon County's impacts will increase as well. At this time, the storm could intensify into a Category 1 hurricane before landfall.
- The most likely arrival of storm impacts would be late tonight, lasting into Monday. The storm continues to slow, meaning heavy rain could last longer, leading to flash floods and causing river levels to rise.

Sandbag Sites

Sandbags remain available to the public at the following Leon County locations:

- Apalachee Regional Park (Solid Waste Management Facility), 7550 Apalachee Parkway
- Fred George Park, 3403 Capital Circle NW
- At the intersection of Oak Ridge Road at Ranchero Road
- Fort Braden Community Park, 15000 Blountstown Highway

Leon County will staff these sites from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to assist residents in quickly filling sandbags. Sand, bags and ties are available for public use. Residents are asked to take no more than 15 bags so as to allow others to prepare.

- Price Gouging During a state of emergency, it is unlawful to sell or lease certain commodities for an amount that grossly exceeds the average price. To report price gouging, call 1-866-966-7226. If you are looking for gas, use GasBuddy.com to report fuel prices and availability.

Plan now because when disaster strikes, it is too late to prepare. Leon County and the City of Tallahassee encourage citizens to put disaster supplies in a waterproof and durable five-gallon bucket. Keep these essential items near an exit door in your home or in your vehicle.

Some important items include a flashlight, medications, nonperishable food and water. Visit <u>LeonReady.com</u> to view the 2024-25 Disaster Survival Guide for disaster preparedness resources and a full list of preparedness items.

Once you and your family have a hurricane preparedness plan in place, check on your neighbors to ensure that they have one, too. Neighborhoods that prepare together create strong support networks that are vital to a speedy recovery. In the event of a major disaster, your neighbors will be your closest resource and support.

Prepare your home for strong winds by visually inspecting trees on your property for poor health and reducing the risk to your home by trimming hanging limbs. If you have any questions about your tree's health, contact a Certified Arborist to assist you.


Update on Passenger Rail Restoration Efforts

In June, Rick traveled to Mobile, Alabama to attend **a meeting of the Southern Rail Commission (SRC)**. The SRC member states — Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana — are making REAL progress in establishing twice daily Amtrak service between New Orleans and Mobile. (See the video clip below.) For the past several months, the City of Mobile, the State of Alabama and Amtrak had been working out the details of Mobile's passenger platform construction project, but things are moving forward and the route is expected to be operational as soon as February 2025.

Rick and other local government officials believe Florida should become an SRC member so we can collaborate with the other Gulf states and bring passenger rail through Tallahassee, Pensacola, Jacksonville and other Florida cities down south. It's a long, time-consuming process, but joining the SRC is the best approach. Stay tuned for ways you can join us in advocating for SRC membership!



On a related note, Rick would like to thank all of the Leon County citizens who responded to our call to action in March, when we asked you to contact the Federal Rail Administration and let them know how much you wanted passenger rail in Tallahassee. Thanks to you, the FRA's subsequent report on new, potential routes showed a HUGE number of public comments coming from Tallahassee, specifically in support of the Dallas to Miami route! See the slide below, which shows the relative number of comments from Tallahassee compared to those from Dallas, Chicago, Miami and other cities. Based on this, it seems Tallahassee sent more comments, per capita, than almost any other city! Thank you once again... demonstrating support like this can make a real difference.

Deadline to Apply for SBA Physical Disaster Loans Approaching in Leon County, Florida



The <u>U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)</u> is reminding businesses, private nonprofit organizations, homeowners and renters in Florida affected by the severe storms, straightline winds, and tornadoes on May 10 to apply for physical damage disaster loans by the **Aug. 16 deadline**.

Those affected by the disaster should not wait to settle with their insurance company before applying for a disaster loan. If a survivor does not know how much of their loss will be covered by insurance or other sources, SBA can make a low-interest disaster loan for the total loss up to its loan limits, provided the borrower agrees to use insurance proceeds to reduce or repay the loan.

The disaster declaration covers Leon County, which is eligible for both Physical and Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the SBA. Small businesses and most private nonprofit organizations in the following adjacent counties are eligible to apply only for SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs): Franklin, Gadsden, Jefferson, Liberty and Wakulla in Florida; and Grady and Thomas in Georgia.

Applicants can still get assistance at SBA's Business Recovery Center (BRC) in Tallahassee. Customer Service Representatives at the BRC will help business owners complete their disaster loan application, accept documents, and provide updates on an application's status. Walk-ins are accepted, but you can schedule an in-person appointment at an SBA Disaster Recovery Center in advance. The Center address and hours of operation are indicated below.

With the changes to FEMA's Sequence of Delivery, survivors are now encouraged to simultaneously apply for FEMA grants and the SBA low-interest disaster loan assistance to fully recover. FEMA grants are intended to cover necessary expenses and serious needs not paid by insurance or other sources. The SBA disaster loan program is designed for your long-term recovery, to make you whole and get you back to your pre-disaster

condition. Do not wait on the decision for a FEMA grant.

For people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability, please dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services.

Submit completed loan applications to SBA no later than **Aug. 16**, **2024**. The deadline to submit economic injury applications is **March 17**, **2025**.

Fall Seed Library



This year's Leon County Fall Seed Library has begun! The Seed Library Program has more than 250,000 seeds available for residents to grow their own gardens this fall.



Since 2015, the Leon County Seed Library Program has offered seasonal seed varieties each fall and spring to residents at the Leon County Public Library. The program encourages residents to practice sustainable gardening and grow their own healthy and nutritious foods at home. Leon County has distributed more than 1.2 million seeds to the

community since the program was established in 2015.

Campaign Sign Recycling Program



Leon County Government has partnered with the Leon County Supervisor of Elections Office, Marpan Recycling, and the League of Women Voters of Tallahassee to facilitate the recycling of old campaign signs. Large recycling bins are stationed throughout Leon County in the weeks after each election to allow campaigns and voters easily recycle campaign signs. This helps to beautify our community as well as recycle the signs and wire stands into usable materials.

What Can I Recycle?

You can recycle plastic campaign signs as well as the metal wire stands. Please separate the sign from the stand before placing both parts into the designed recycling bin.

Where Are the Recycling Spots?

Sign recycling bins will be available at each Leon County Branch Library as well as several other locations throughout Leon County after each election. The recycling bins are located in the parking lot of each facility, allowing for easy unloading of signs from your vehicle into the bin.

When Are the Recycling Bins Available?

The bins will be available at the Leon County libraries for one week after each election:

Primary: August 21 - August 28, 2024

General: November 6 - November 13, 2024

The bins located at the Elections Center, Hazardous Waste Drop off, and Marpan Recycling will be available for four weeks after each election:

- Primary: August 21 September 19, 2024
- General: November 6 December 5, 2024

The bins are open and accessible 24 hours a day, seven days a week during these dates.

County Seeking Applications for the Children's Service Council



Leon County Government is currently seeking applications from qualified individuals interested in serving on the Children's Services Council of Leon County. Approved by voters during the November 2020 General Election, the Children Services Council is an independent special district that is responsible for funding children's services throughout the County by levying ad valorem taxes estimated at up to \$8 million annually.

All applications must be completed and submitted electronically by Friday, August 23, at <u>LeonCountyFL.gov/CSCApplication</u>. To be eligible, applicants must be a resident of Leon County for the previous 24-month period and be willing to submit an annual Statement of Financial Interests Form.

The Children Services Council (CSC) functions to support organizations that serve children and families in Leon County and will work to identify children's needs in the community, target those needs with evidence-based programs, and evaluate results. In accordance with Florida Statute, the CSC is comprised of ten members, five of whom are appointed by the Governor's Office from a list of candidates submitted by the Leon County Board of County Commissioners. This list will include at least three recommendations for the upcoming vacancy (a minimum total of 3 candidates).

As part of the application, applicants are asked to attach a resume or provide a brief explanation of how their skills, experience, or educational background will contribute to the CSC. Additionally, Florida Statute requires that, to the extent possible, those appointed

represent the demographic diversity of the population of Leon County. To assure the fullest consideration, applications should thoroughly respond to each question.



Bicentennial Beginnings: The Founding of Tallahassee and Leon County


Imagine Freedom Podcast

Leon County Accepting Tourism Grant Applications For Signature, Special & Sports

Events



The Leon County Division of Tourism (Visit Tallahassee) grant application process for the 2024-25 Signature/Emerging Signature, Special and Sports Event Grant is now open. Applications are **due by Thursday, August 22, 2024, at 5 p.m.** This opportunity represents the ongoing effort to promote tourism and provide financial support for events that have a history of, or show potential to, attract out-of-town visitors to the area.

Eligible event(s) must take place between Oct. 1, 2024, and Sept. 30, 2025, and are required to comply with Section 125.0104, Florida Statutes, for the utilization of Tourist Development Tax (TDT) funds. Event grant applications are evaluated based on the historical or potential ability to attract overnight visitors, appeal to the general public, demonstrate out-of-area marketing activities, and include scheduled programming/activities during non-peak periods. Event funding levels are determined by the anticipated number of hotel room nights/overnight lodging in Leon County generated by the event.

All grant applicants must attend one of three workshops. An in-person workshop will be held on Friday, August 2, 2024, at 11 a.m. at the Leon County Office of Resource Stewardship (ORS) Gathering Room, located at 1907 South Monroe Street.
