Bailey's Brainstorms

When I joined the Friends in late 2019, I thought I knew what to expect: we're a group that treasures the Library and everything it does for our community, and our mission is to support the Library and its programs. We collect donations, host events, and provide a volunteer base to help the Library do all the things it does. Simple, right? Imagine, therefore, my surprise when the first assignment I was given as a member of the Friends board was to analyze the Friends' holding of a parcel of land in Arizona and recommend a course of action.

Yes, you read that right. Years ago, a generous benefactor had deeded a parcel of vacant land in south-central Arizona to the Friends as a donation. The land itself was a stretch of windswept desert hillside located nine miles north of the Mexican border, just outside the town of Rio Rico (population 19,000). None of us had ever visited the site, but we continually joked about organizing a field trip to see it (and the lovely state park nearby). And now, my task, consistent with the Friends' mission, was to figure out how to make all that sand and sagebrush support the Library and its programs.

Many options presented themselves. My first thought was that the Arizona Land (as it had come to be known) could be used as backup storage for the red tote-bags the Friends sell during the Title Wave, but this option was rejected because they might blend in with the landscape and be inadvertently misplaced. Suggestions to use it for offsite Library parking and as a place to maroon individuals with substantial late fees were similarly vetoed. Given its remoteness, I thought the administrators of the Federal Witness Protection Program might find it an excellent buy, but—for reasons that I confess are obvious in hindsight—it appears that nobody knows their address nor how to contact them.

Ultimately, after much brainstorming and a bevy of phone calls, the Arizona Land was sold to a private buyer in Rio Rico. The proceeds were used to support Library programs like the Library of Things and ongoing literacy programs. It goes to show that, with a strong commitment to the Library and a little creativity, the Friends can find a way to use just about anything and turn it to the Library's—and, thus, our community's—benefit.

The Friends of the Library has partnered with the Knight Creative Communities Institute (KCCI) to create Wander & Wonder Story Trails at three Leon County library and park locations: Pedrick Pond/Eastside Branch, Fort Braden, and Woodville. The Story Trails will bring books outdoors through ADA accessible, interactive stories that people can read as they walk along the trails. In other words, the project



will include elements to enhance literacy while merging art and nature. The books will rotate throughout the year thanks to a collaborative partnership with Leon County Libraries and a special library committee responsible for selecting the books. Two FOL Board members, Jonathan Klepper and Morgan Evers, will serve on this committee.

The Wander & Wonder Story Trails are a component of the KCCI 2022 Community Catalyst team's "Fully Booked" initiative to merge art, nature, and literature throughout Leon County.
